Featured Item

<u>Crop Insurance Premium Subsidies Now Linked to Conservation</u> <u>Compliance Provisions – Do They Apply To You?</u>

The 2014 Farm Bill re-linked the highly erodible land conservation and wetlands conservation provisions to crop insurance premium subsidies. USDA's Risk Management Agency (RMA), Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) and Farm Service Agency (FSA) are urgently reminding all producers to file form AD-1026 with their local FSA office to maintain eligibility for federal crop insurance premium support. Producers must have this certification complete by **June 1, 2015**, to be eligible for premium subsidy during the 2016 reinsurance year. If producers do not have an AD-1026 on file with FSA by June 1, 2015, producers can obtain crop insurance, but will be responsible for the full premium amount for all policies and plans of insurance obtained for the 2016 reinsurance year. FSA Seeking County Committee Nominations

FSA is accepting nominations from individuals interested in serving on their local County Committee. To be eligible you must reside in the County and farm in the administrative area within the county that will be voting in 2015. These elections provide farmers and ranchers the opportunity to run for and be elected to represent producers in their community as an elected member of their local FSA County Committee. California Dairy Industry Outreach Meetings

Sales Closing Date Nears for Crop Insurance Programs

USDA's Risk Management Agency (RMA) reminds producers that the final dates to apply for crop insurance on most insurable planted crops are fast approaching. Producers need to purchase, review, or modify their crop insurance policies before these sales closing dates have passed. Crop insurance provides protection against crop production losses due to natural perils such as drought, hail, and excessive moisture. The last day to buy or change a policy for potatoes (summer planted) in San Joaquin County is **May 31, 2015**. Crop insurance is sold and delivered solely through private crop insurance agents. A list of crop insurance agents is available at all USDA Service Centers and online at the RMA <u>Agent Locator</u>.

Census of Horticultural Specialties & Floriculture Continues

Enumerators are still collecting data for the 2014 Census of Horticultural Specialties to gather detailed information on horticultural production and sales in California. Producers can fill out the form online at <u>www.agcensus.usda.gov</u>, or return their form by mail. NASS will publish the Census of Horticulture results in December 2015 and the annual Floriculture Crops report on June 4, 2015. Two Major Mid-Year NASS Surveys Coming Soon

During the next several weeks, USDA's National Agricultural Statistics Service (NASS) will conduct two major mid-year surveys, the June Agricultural Survey and the June Area Survey. The agency will survey farmers across California to determine crop production and supplies levels in 2015. NASS gathers the data for the June Agriculture Survey online, by mail and/or by phone. For the June Area Survey, agency representatives will visit randomly selected tracts of land and interview the operators of any farm or ranch on that land. Growers will provide information on crop acreage – including biotech crops—as well as grain stocks, livestock inventory, cash rents, land values, and value of sales. NASS will compile and analyze the survey information and publish the results in a series of USDA reports, including the annual *Acreage* report and quarterly *Grain Stocks* report, both to be released June 30, 2015. Survey data contribute to NASS's monthly and annual *Crop Production* reports, as well as the annual *Small Grains Summary* and USDA's monthly *World Agricultural Supply and Demand Estimates*. Funding Opportunities

Funds Available for Farm Labor Housing

USDA Rural Development is now accepting pre-applications for Farm Labor Housing (FLH) loans and grants to construct new off-farm units or purchase and rehabilitate existing non-FLH properties. Nationally, there is \$26.6 million available in loans and grants. Complete details are available in the March 25 <u>Federal Register notice</u> or on Rural Development's <u>website</u>. Farm to School Grant Program

USDA Food and Nutrition Service announced funds are available to support the Farm to School Grant Program. The purpose of the program is to assist eligible entities in implementing farm to school programs that improve access to local foods in eligible schools. The request for application (RFA) for fiscal year 2016 funding is now available. More information is available in USDA's press release, or in the application guidance.

Agricultural Conservation Easement Program (ACEP)

The Agricultural Conservation Easement Program (ACEP) provides financial and technical assistance to help conserve agricultural lands and wetlands and their related benefits. The 2014 Farm Bill consolidated three previous conservation easement programs into ACEP to make it easier for diverse agricultural landowners to fully benefit from conservation initiatives. Under the Agricultural Land Easements component, NRCS helps Indian tribes, state and local governments and non-governmental organizations protect working agricultural lands and limit non-agricultural uses of the land. Under the Wetlands Reserve Easements component, NRCS helps to restore, protect and enhance enrolled wetlands. For more information please see the webpage.

<u>Environmental Quality Incentives Program (EQIP) moves to Continuous</u> <u>Funding Model</u>

To help support a continuous sign-up, planning and obligation process, applications for the Environmental Quality Incentives Program (EQIP) are now accepted year-round, and will be evaluated for funding based on the FY2015 batching schedule. Funds will be distributed according to an allocation schedule that will provide a source of funding for each of the designated batching periods. Applicants may apply for NRCS programs at any time during the year. Application batching periods will close on the third Friday of the month according to the batching period schedule below:

- Batching Period 4 June 19, 2015
- Batching Period 5 July 17, 2015

Energy Grants Still Available to Help with Drought Related Projects

USDA Rural Development's Rural Energy for America Program (REAP) can help with a variety of energy efficiency and renewable energy projects – including those to assist with the impacts of California's drought. Efficient irrigation pumps, diesel motor replacement and solar panels are all eligible uses of REAP funds. Grants can cover up to 25% of the project cost up to \$500,000, and loan guarantees for up to 75% of the project cost up to \$25 million are available depending on the project. The next funding deadline is **June 30, 2015**. Elections for Administrative Committee for Pistachios

The Administrative Committee for Pistachios (Committee), which administers the Federal marketing order for pistachios grown in California, Arizona and New Mexico, is conducting elections to seat new members for the term of office that expires on June 30, 2017. The positions to be filled include five producer members; two each in District 1 and District 2, and one in District 4, and their alternate producer members. In addition to the producer member positions, a handler member and that member's alternate position also need to be filled. The handler position can be filled by a handler from any of the four Districts covered by the Federal marketing order. USDA, which oversees the administration of the marketing order, is working with the Committee to enhance the diversity of the Committee and is encouraging eligible women, minorities, and people with disabilities to consider running for office.
