

State Environmental Coordinator Training

National State Environmental Coordinator training was held in Denver, Colorado the week of June 5th. Keith Farrell, State Environmental Coordinator for New Hampshire, attended the training along with the other 49 Environmental Coordinators from each of the other states. John Johnson, James Fortner and others from Washington, DC provided the 3 day training session on a variety of environmental issues.

Topics discussed included the new 1-EQ environmental handbook with amendments, Information Technology applications for environmental issues, Historic Preservation, Wetland Protection, Environmental Justice and other key aspects to the National Environmental Policy Act and its implications for FSA programs.

Additional training focused on dealing with hazardous materials and recognition of dangerous substance marking and labeling. Jeff Johnson, State Environmental Coordinator for Minnesota, provided some timely training on recognition and cleanup of clandestine drug labs.

Each day was filled with helpful and applicable training that the SEC's will now use to train their local staffs.

CED Management Training

Irene Schmidt, CED in Coos-Carroll County attended Phase I of the CED management course, held from June 11 through June 16, 2006 in Buffalo, NY.

The training is designed to provide participants with valuable management and supervisory skills to assist in office operations. Attendees in the program were a diverse group, coming from Maine, New Hampshire, North Carolina, New York, Rhode Island, West Virginia, Puerto Rico, and California.



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Flood News

Excessive rain during the month of May, and continuing into June, has created more than a challenge for many agricultural producers. Acreage which had already been planted washed away or rotted in the field, new river channels were cut out, debris and silt were deposited, and fences were damaged. Hay fields are too wet to cut, and fears are that the quality has been greatly diminished. As a result of all the rain, seven New Hampshire counties received Presidential Disaster Declaration M1643. Belknap, Carroll, Grafton, Hillsborough, Merrimack, Rockingham and Strafford were primary disaster counties, with Cheshire, Coos, and Sullivan as contiguous counties. This makes all New Hampshire counties eligible for Emergency Loans.

Emergency Conservation Program

Three New Hampshire counties have been approved for the Emergency Conservation Program. Grafton, Merrimack, and Belknap counties have received over \$200,000 to aid producers who have experienced damage from recent flash flooding. Practices to be implemented will include EC1, Removing Debris From Farmland, EC2, Grading, Shaping, Releveling, or Similar Measures, EC3, Restoring Permanent Fences, and EC4, Restoring Conservation Structures and Other Installations.

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
