### Primary

### Contiguous

6/17/11 – President Designates 35 counties and 4 Indian Reservations in MT as Presidential Natural Disaster areas due to severe storms occurring April 3, 8, 22, 26 and 30, 2011; May 9-10, 18-21, and 30, 2011 and continuing – M1996 – Big Horn, Campbell, Crook, Park, Sheridan Counties.

## 2010 WY Disaster Designations



### Primary

07/15/10 - President Designates Fremont County and portions of the Wind River Reservation, WY as a Presidential Major Disaster for Flooding from June 4 - 18, 2010 - M1923.

### Contiguous

07/15/10 - President Designates Fremont County and portions of the Wind River Reservation, WY as a Presidential Major Disaster for Flooding from June 4 - 18, 2010 - M1923 - Carbon, Natrona, Sublette, Teton, Hot Springs, Park, Sweetwater and Washakie Counties.

05/10/10 - [USDA Designates 5 Nebraska Counties as Natural Disaster Areas](#) for severe winter storms with excessive snow, excessive rain, high winds and blizzard conditions beginning 10/01/09 and continuing - S2994 - Goshen and Laramie Counties.

## 2009 WY Disaster Designations



### Primary

01/04/10 - The U.S. Department of Agriculture has designated Big Horn and Park Counties in Wyoming as primary natural disaster areas due to a severe freeze that occurred during the period of Oct. 6 through Oct. 13, 2009. (For more information [click here](#))

12/31/09 - The U.S. Department of Agriculture has designated Platte County in Wyoming as a primary natural disaster area due to losses caused by hailstorms that occurred during the 2009 crop year. (For more information [click here](#))

12/09/09 - The U.S. Department of Agriculture has designated Johnson County in Wyoming as a primary natural disaster area due to losses caused by drought that occurred during the period of May 1, 2009, and continuing. (For more information [click here](#))

### Contiguous

01/06/10 - The U.S. Department of Agriculture has designated Beaverhead, Broadwater, Carbon, Chouteau, Gallatin, Lake, Madison, Richland and Treasure counties in Montana as primary natural disaster areas due to a heavy freeze and cold weather that occurred during the period of Oct. 8, through Oct. 14, 2009. 01/04/10 - The U.S. Department of Agriculture has designated Big Horn and Park Counties in Wyoming as primary natural disaster areas due to a severe freeze that occurred during the period of Oct. 6 through Oct. 13, 2009. (For more information [click here](#))

12/31/09 - The U.S. Department of Agriculture has designated Platte County in Wyoming as a primary natural disaster area due to losses caused by hailstorms that occurred during the 2009 crop year. (For more information [click here](#))

12/09/09 - The U.S. Department of Agriculture has designated Johnson County in Wyoming as a primary natural disaster area due to losses caused by drought that occurred during the period of May 1, 2009, and continuing. (For more information [click here](#))

10/20/09 - The U.S. Department of Agriculture designated 10 counties in South Dakota as primary natural disaster areas because of losses caused by the combined effects of severe storms with hail, high winds, flooding and grasshopper infestations, which occurred during the period of Jan.1, 2009, and continuing. 06/17/09 - USDA Designates 14 South Dakota Counties as Natural Disaster Areas for Severe Storms and Flooding from 3/11/09 and continuing - M1844 - Crook County. Termination Date: 02/16/10. (Presidential)

02/12/09 – The U.S. Department of Agriculture designated Custer and Falls River counties in South Dakota as primary natural disaster areas because of losses caused by drought conditions that occurred from May 1, 2008, through Nov 21, 2008. Farm operators in Pennington and Shannon counties in South Dakota also qualify for natural disaster benefits because their counties are contiguous. (For more information [click here](#))

## 2008 WY Disaster Designations

### Contiguous

12/01/08 – The U.S. Department of Agriculture designated three counties in Montana as primary natural disaster areas. Big Horn County, Mont., was designated a primary natural disaster area because of losses caused by severe storms, heavy winds, excessive rain and hail that occurred from May 1, 2008, through Aug. 3, 2008. Farm operators in Carbon, Powder River, Rosebud, Treasure and Yellowstone counties in Montana also qualify for natural disaster benefits because their counties are contiguous. Farm operators in Big Horn and Sheridan counties in the adjacent state of Wyoming also qualify for natural disaster benefits because their counties are contiguous. Gallatin and Madison counties in Montana were designated primary natural disaster areas because of losses caused by severe storms, heavy winds, excessive rain, hail and flooding that occurred on July 22, 2008. Farm operators in Beaverhead, Broadwater, Jefferson, Meagher, Park and Silver Bow counties in Montana also qualify for natural disaster benefits because their counties are contiguous.

11/07/08 - The U.S. Department of Agriculture designated six counties in Colorado as primary natural disaster areas for three separate disaster conditions. Alamosa, Larimer, Pueblo and Saguache counties in Colorado were designated primary natural disaster areas because of losses caused by hail that occurred during the period of July 28, 2008, through Sept. 3, 2008. 09/12/08 – The U.S. Department of Agriculture designated 24 Colorado counties as primary natural disaster areas because of losses caused by drought that occurred during the period of Jan. 1, 2008, and continuing. (For more information [click here](#))

07/09/08 - USDA Designates 27 South Dakota Counties as Natural Disaster Areas for a severe winter storm and record and near record snow June 2-12, 2008 – M1774 – Crook and Weston. Termination Date: 03/09/09.

05/22/08 – USDA Designates 5 South Dakota Counties as Natural Disaster Areas for a severe winter storm and record and near record snow May 1-2, 2008 – M1759 - Crook. Termination Date: 01/22/09.

## 2007 WY Disaster Designations



### Primary

12/11/07 – The U.S. Department of Agriculture designated Park County, Wyo., as a primary natural disaster area because of losses caused by drought that occurred from Jan. 1, 2007, and continuing. Farm operators in Big Horn, Fremont, Hot Springs, Teton and Washakie counties in Wyoming also qualify for natural disaster benefits because their counties are contiguous. 11/16/07 – The U.S. Department of Agriculture designated Albany and Uinta counties in Wyoming as primary natural disaster areas because of losses caused by drought that occurred on Jan. 1, 2007, and continuing. Farm operators in Carbon, Converse, Laramie, Lincoln, Natrona, Platte and Sweetwater counties in Wyoming also qualify for natural disaster benefits because their counties are contiguous. 11/09/07 – The U.S. Department of Agriculture designated 11 Wyoming counties as primary natural disaster areas because of losses caused by drought that occurred during the period Jan. 1, 2007, and continuing. (For more information [click here](#))

12/11/07 – The U.S. Department of Agriculture designated 32 Idaho counties as primary natural disaster areas because of losses caused by severe drought and unprecedented wildfires that occurred in 2007. (For more information [click here](#))

12/11/07 – The U.S. Department of Agriculture designated Park County, Wyo., as a primary natural disaster area because of losses caused by drought that occurred from Jan. 1, 2007, and continuing. Farm operators in Big Horn, Fremont, Hot Springs, Teton and Washakie counties in Wyoming also qualify for natural disaster benefits because their counties are contiguous. 11/16/07 - The U.S. Department of Agriculture designated Albany and Uinta counties in Wyoming as primary natural disaster areas because of losses caused by drought that occurred on Jan. 1, 2007, and continuing. (For more information [click here](#))

11/09/07 – The U.S. Department of Agriculture designated 11 Wyoming counties as primary natural disaster areas because of losses caused by drought that occurred during the period Jan. 1, 2007, and continuing. (For more information [click here](#))

10/24/07 – The U.S. Department of Agriculture designated Bennett, Jackson, Pennington and Shannon counties in South Dakota as primary natural disaster areas because of losses caused by drought, high temperatures, and forest and prairie fires that occurred from Jan. 1, 2007, and continuing. 08/22/07 - The U.S. Department of Agriculture designated 24 Utah counties as primary natural disaster areas because of losses caused by the combined effects of multiple disasters, including severe drought, insect infestations, killing frosts, hot dry winds, below normal runoff, wildfires, and flash floods. 08/16/07 - The U.S. Department of Agriculture designated Custer and Fall River counties in South Dakota as primary natural disaster areas because of losses caused by drought, high temperatures, and forest and prairie fires that occurred from Jan. 1, 2007, and continuing. 08/16/07 - USDA Designates Montana County Natural Disaster Area for extreme flooding along with Big Horn and Sheridan as contiguous because of losses caused by extreme flooding conditions that occurred from June 6, 2007, through June 13, 2007. (For more information [click here](#))

08/14/07 - USDA Designates Nine Nebraska Counties Natural Disaster Areas designated nine Nebraska counties as primary natural disaster areas because of losses caused by the combined effects of continuing heavy rains, flooding, hail and high winds that began Jan. 1, 2007. Goshen, Laramie and Niobrara Counties were designated as contiguous counties in Wyoming. (For more information [click here](#))

03/26/07 - USDA Designates Four Montana Counties Natural Disaster Areas designated Big Horn, Rosebud and Treasure counties in Montana primary natural disaster areas due to losses caused by excessive fall moisture and early frost that occurred during the period Sept. 15, 2006, through Dec. 1, 2006. Also eligible because they are contiguous are Carbon, Custer, Garfield, Musselshell, Petroleum, Powder River and Yellowstone counties. In addition, Big Horn and Sheridan counties in the adjacent state of **Wyoming** are also eligible because they are contiguous.
