Marketing Assistance Loans (MAL) Available on Wheat

Short-term financing is available by obtaining low interest commodity loans for eligible harvested production. A nine-month Marketing Assistance Loan provides financing that allows producers to store production for later marketing. The crop may be stored on the farm or in the warehouse. The interest rate for July is 1.125 percent. Crop certification is required.

Loans are available for producers who share in the risk of producing the eligible commodity and maintain beneficial interest in the crop through the duration of the loan. Beneficial interest means retaining the ability to make decisions about the commodity, responsibility for loss because of damage to the commodity and title to the commodity. Once beneficial interest in a commodity is lost, it is ineligible for a loan, even if you regain beneficial interest. 2014 loan rates for Lenawee County are: Wheat (SRW) \$2.56; Wheat (White) \$2.46

Highly Erodible Land and Wetland Compliance

Landowners and operators are reminded that in order to receive payments from USDA, they must be compliant with Highly Erodible Land (HEL) and Wetland Conservation (WC) provisions. Farmers with HEL determined soils must apply tillage, crop residue and rotation requirements as specified in their conservation plan.

Producers should notify FSA prior to conducting land clearing or drainage projects to ensure compliance. If you intend to clear any trees to create new cropland, these areas will need to be reviewed to ensure any work will not jeopardize your eligibility for benefits.

Landowners and operators can complete form AD-1026 Highly Erodible Land Conservation (HELC) and Wetland Conservation (WC) Certification to determine whether a referral to Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) is necessary.

Loans for the Socially Disadvantaged

FSA has a number of loan programs available to assist applicants to begin or continue in agriculture production. Loans are available for operating or to purchase or improve farms or ranches.

While all qualified producers are eligible to apply for these loan programs, FSA has provided priority funding for members of socially disadvantaged groups. A socially disadvantaged applicant is one of a group whose members have been subjected to racial, ethnic or gender prejudice because of his or her identity as members of the group without regard to his or her individual qualities. For purposes of this program, socially disadvantaged groups are women, African Americans, American Indians, Alaskan Natives, Hispanics, Asian Americans and Pacific Islanders.

FSA loans are only available to applicants who meet all the eligibility requirements and are unable to obtain the needed credit elsewhere.

Water Quality Cruise and Conservation Reserve Program (CRP) Information

On Friday, August 22nd the Washtenaw Conservation District, NRCS, Farm Bureau, and NFWF have partnered to host a boat cruise meeting on the Maumee River from 9am – noon. Participants will board the 65' Sandpiper to gain a firsthand look at water quality in the Maumee River, pass by the grain elevators and learn more about harmful algae blooms, MAEAP and Conservation Practices to protect water resources. The Farm Service Agency will be presenting information on CRP and other information on the Farm Bill programs. There is no fee to attend, but participants must pay for their own lunches. Last Call for FSA County Committee Nominations

Nominate yourself or a candidate of your choice to serve on your local county committee. We especially encourage the nomination of beginning farmers and ranchers, as well as women and minorities. Organizations representing minorities and women also may nominate candidates. This is your opportunity to contribute to how

federal programs are delivered in Lenawee County. FSA county committees work closely with county executive directors and make decisions on disaster and conservation programs, emergency programs, commodity price support loan programs and other agricultural issues. Members serve three-year terms. Nationwide, there are about 7,800 farmers and ranchers serving on FSA county committees. To be eligible to serve on an FSA county committee, a person must participate or cooperate in a program administered by FSA, be eligible to vote in a county committee election and reside in the local administrative area where the person is nominated. The election this year will be for producers in Local Administrative Area (LAA) II, consisting of the following townships: Rollin, Hudson, Dover, Madison, Medina, Seneca and Fairfield. The current County Committeeperson from this area is Genie Hillard of Jasper. County Committees are a vital link between the farm community and the U.S. Department of Agriculture. To become a candidate, an eligible individual must sign the nomination form, FSA-669A. The form and other information about FSA elections are available online at http://www.fsa.usda.gov/elections. Nomination forms are also available at the office and must be postmarked or received in the local USDA Service Center by close of business on Friday, August 1, 2014.
