DCP DIRECT- DCP ACRE SIGNUP

Enrollment for the 2010 DCP Direct and DCP ACRE programs started October 1, 2009. The deadline for enrollment is June 1, 2010. Now is the time to be calling for **appointments to enroll**. There are no rules or fees allowing Producers to sign in to the program after June 1st.

Farms with 10 acres or less of base will be ineligible for payments. Exceptions apply to socially disadvantaged and limited resource producers.

Supplemental Revenue Assistance Program (SURE) SIGNUP BEGINS

Signup for the **SURE program** began January 4, 2010; an ending date for the 2008 signup period has not been established.

This program replaces past ad hoc disaster programs for crops. Payments are earned when there is a revenue loss on all of a producer's farms combined. To be eligible, producers are required to have crop insurance or non-insured assistance (NAP) coverage on all crops, on all farms in the nation that are of economic significance. Economically significant is defined as a crop that is expected to contribute at least 5% of the farms income. For **SURE** to be available in a crop year, a county must have a "Secretarial" disaster declaration (or be contiguous to a disaster declared county) and the farm must suffer at least a 10% production loss on at least one crop, **OR** the actual production must be less than 50% of the normal production. Revenue losses cannot be determined until after the market year average prices have been determined (June 1 for wheat; September 1 for corn and soybeans). SURE payments equate to 60% of the difference between the guarantee and total farm revenue.

Both St Clair and Macomb Counties had Secretarial Disaster declarations for 2008, therefore, producers who obtained crop insurance or NAP coverage on all crops of economic significance will be eligible to apply.

To assist farmers in evaluating their options with SURE, USDA has created a SURE calculator. To utilize the calculator, visit the website www.fsa.usda.gov\mi and look under "Hot Links". Please note that the calculator and instructions linked on the FSA website are for informational purposes only. This calculator in no way binds FSA to potential payments under SURE and should not be relied on as the sole source of information to make final management decisions.



Appointments Recommended

We recommend you call to make an appointment before coming to the office to conduct business. This will enable us to prepare any necessary paperwork and research issues before your appointment. We realize how important your time is and this will reduce the amount of time that you have to wait in the office.

ACRE PPRODUCTIN REPORTING

Producers participating in the ACRE program must report their actual crop yields for 2009, acceptable documentation includes:

Receipts of crops sold, (settlements statements, etc.)

Appraisals performed by crop insurance

Paid measurement of bins or other farm storage

Please **note**, that actual farm yields must be reported by the subsequent crop year's acreage reporting deadline. (June 30th for fall seed crops, July 14th for spring seed crops.

Reporting Changes in Your Farm Operations

It is important that you contact the office with *any* record changes that may have occurred in your operation. These changes include, but are not limited to:

- Address any contact information.
- Direct Deposit to ensure payments are deposited correctly, it is imperative that any changes in bank account information are updated immediately.
- Development land removed for houses, etc., needs to be reported.
- Owner/Operator Changes changes in land ownership, tenants or crop share arrangements. (Note: We will require NEW LEASES!)
- Reconstitutions farm and/or tract combinations or separations due to sale of land or change in operators.
- Farm Operating Plan changes to the farming operation that may have an effect on "person" and/or "actively engaged" determinations (eligibility).

NEW DISTRICT CONSERVATIONIST

Ben Thelen assumed the duties of District Conservationist for the Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) in early December. We welcome Ben and look forward to working with him. CONTINUOUS CRP

The Continuous Conservation Reserve Program allows participants the opportunity to enroll environmentally sensitive acreages in conservation practices that will reduce soil erosion, improve water & soil quality and provide wildlife habitat and food sources. The Continuous CRP is a voluntary enrollment program. Eligible landowners enter into contracts that range from 10 to 15 years in length. In return the landowners receive annual rental payments, incentive payments for certain practices and cost share for establishment of the practice.

To be eligible for enrollment in the Continuous CRP, participants and acreage offered must meet certain requirements. Provided the eligibility requirements are met, FSA will automatically accept enrollments of acreage into Continuous CRP. Landowners may enroll in the program at any time during the year.

NEW FARM LOAN OFFICER

BEGINNING AND LIMITED RESOURCE FARMERS

FSA assists beginning farmers and or members of socially disadvantaged groups to finance agricultural enterprises. Under these designated farm loan programs, FSA can provide financing to eligible applicants through either direct or guaranteed loans. FSA defines a beginning farmer as a person who:

- Has operated a farm for not more than 10 years
- Will materially and substantially participate in the operation of the farm
- Agrees to participate in a loan assessment, borrower training and financial management program sponsored by FSA
- Does not own a farm in excess of 30 percent of the county's median size

Each member of an entity must meet the eligibility requirements. Loan approval is not guaranteed. For additional Farm Loan information contact Larry Sheridan at 810 664-0895.

Prevented Planting Acreage

FSA issued revised provisions regarding the maximum number of prevented planted acres to be approved. FSA will no longer base the eligibility on the history of planting and/or prevented planting of the specific crop.

Deadline to file for prevented planting acreage must be requested *within 15 days* of the ending planting date.



NAP Production Reporting

Production records for individual crops need to be filed with our office to establish an approved NAP yield. If this is the first year you participated in NAP, you can provide production and acreage information from prior years to establish your yield. If you participated in NAP in previous years, you must report your production and acreage on a yearly basis to keep your yield up-to-date.

Records submitted must be reliable and verifiable. Records need to show crop disposition. It is recommended producers submit 2009 production records as soon as possible after harvest. All production records must be submitted by the subsequent crop year's final acreage reporting date.

Farm Storage Facility Loan Program Changes

The Farm Storage Facility Loan (FSFL) program allows producers of eligible commodities to obtain low-interest financing to build or upgrade farm storage and handling facilities.

The new maximum principal amount of a loan through FSFL is \$500,000. Participants are now required to provide a down payment of 15 percent, with CCC providing a loan for the remaining 85 percent of the net cost of the eligible storage facility and permanent drying and handling equipment. New loan terms of 7, 10 or 12 years are available depending on the amount of the loan. Interest rates for each term rate may be different and are based on the rate which CCC borrows from the Treasury Department. Payments are available in the form of a partial disbursement and the remaining final disbursement. The partial disbursement will be available after a portion of the construction has been completed. The final fund disbursement will be made when all construction is completed. The maximum amount of the partial disbursement will be 50 percent of the projected and approved total loan amount.

Applications for FSFL must be submitted to the FSA county office that maintains the farm's records. An FSFL must be approved before any site preparation or construction can begin. The following commodities are eligible for farm storage facility loans:

Corn, grain sorghum, rice, soybeans, oats, peanuts, wheat, barley or minor oilseeds harvested as whole grain.
Corn, grain sorghum, wheat, oats or barley harvested as other-than-whole grain.
Pulse crops - lentils, small chickpeas and dry peas.

Hay.

Renewable biomass.
Fruits (including nuts) and vegetables -

cold storage facilities.

Marketing Assistance Loan

A 9-month Marketing Assistance Loan (MAL) is available for producers who share in the risk of producing the crop. To be eligible, a producer must maintain continual beneficial interest in the crop from harvest through the earlier of the date the loan is repaid or CCC takes title to the commodity. Beneficial interest means retaining the ability to make decisions about the commodity; responsibility for loss or damage to the commodity; and title to the commodity. Once beneficial interest in a commodity is lost, the commodity is ineligible for loan — even if the producer regains beneficial interest.

Commodity loan eligibility also requires compliance with conservation and wetland protection requirements; beneficial interest requirements, acreage reporting and ensuring that the commodity meets Commodity Credit Corporation minimum grade and quality standards. For commodities to be eligible they must have been produced by an eligible producer, be in existence and in a storable condition and be merchantable for food, feed or other uses as determined by CCC. The quality of the commodity in farm storage must be maintained throughout the term of the loan.

Producers do not have to participate in the Direct and Counter-Cyclical and/or ACRE Programs to be eligible for commodity loans.

The Final Availability date to request a wheat, barley or oat loan is March 31, 2010. For Corn and soybeans the final date is May 31, 2010.
