2010 FSA County Committee Elections

Election of agricultural producers to Farm Service Agency (FSA) county committees is important to ALL farmers and ranchers, whether beginning or long-established, with large or small operations. It is crucial that every eligible producer participate in these elections because FSA county committees are a link between the agricultural community and the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

The Wyandot County Farm Service Agency is looking for individuals interested in serving on the Wyandot County Committee. This year LAA-3 will be having an election and this area is comprised of the following townships: Mifflin, Jackson, Marseille, Pitt and Antrim. Any eligible person residing in one of these townships who is interested in running for County Committee, or would like to nominate an individual to run for County Committee, must complete a nomination form. The Nomination form for County FSA Committee Election (FSA-669A) is available at the Wyandot County FSA office. Members of socially disadvantaged groups (a group whose members have been subjected to racial, ethnic, or gender prejudice because of their identity as members of a group without regard to their individual qualities) are strongly encouraged to complete the Nomination Form for County FSA Committee Election (FSA-669A) and nominate themselves or another eligible candidate.

Committee members make decisions on applications for federal farm program and disaster payments. Committee members play a vital role by helping local farmers manage tough financial times and natural disasters. County committee members make many other important decisions that affect local farmers such as whether haying and grazing should be allowed on Conservation Reserve Program land.

The nomination period begins June 15th and runs until August 2, 2010. Nomination forms for the 2010 election must be postmarked or received in the local FSA office by close of business on Aug. 2, 2010. Ballots will be mailed to eligible voters November 5th and must be returned by December 6, 2010. The elected Committee Member and Alternates will take office January 1, 2011.

Incumbent committee person who is currently serving in Local Area #3 is Henry Bils, with Jerry Murphy serving as the Committee Chairperson. Chuck Bigler is Vice Chairperson and Connie Iles acts as Minority Advisor to the FSA County Committee.

Final Loan/LDP Availability Date

Producers are reminded that the final commodity loan and LDP availability date for 2009 Crop Year Corn, Dry Peas, Grain Sorghum, Lentils, Mustard Seed, Safflower Seed, Small Chickpeas, Soybeans and Sunflower seed **is June 1, 2010.**

Will A General CRP Sign-up Happen This Year?

A CRP general sign-up may occur in Fiscal Year (FY) 2010, however the National FSA office said details and the specific sign-up start date will be announced upon completion of an Environmental Impact Statement. The completion of the Environmental Impact Statement is expected to finish later this summer. Until then, producers are encouraged to utilize other whole field CRP practice opportunity such as SAFE and Wellhead Protection Areas.

Maintaining Stored Grain Quality

With the high temperatures this spring, producers are reminded to keep an eye on the condition and quality of the stored grain. Remember to contact your local FSA office if you notice changes in the condition and quality of the stored grain.

Have You Contacted the Wyandot County FSA office? ACRE and DCP Program Enrollment Deadline Rapidly Approaching.

Vicki D. Orians, the Farm Service Agency (FSA) County Executive Director, is asking Wyandot County producers "Have you contacted our FSA office?" The June 1, 2010, deadline for enrollment into the 2010 Average Crop Revenue Election (ACRE) Program or the traditional Direct and Counter-cyclical Program (DCP) is rapidly approaching. **This deadline is mandatory for all participants and USDA will not accept any late-file applications. We are told, the National FSA office will not extend the sign-up deadline date, past June 1.**

Orians explained that, "With the favorable spring weather conditions, it is critical for producers to begin the enrollment process as soon as possible". 1363 total farms were enrolled in DCP/ACRE Program during 2009. "To date, approximately 60% of our farms have been enrolled in 2010 DCP/ACRE Programs. At the current rate of enrollment, a significant number of farms eligible for 2010 DCP/ACRE may not be enrolled by the June 1, 2010, deadline."

All signatures by producers receiving a share in DCP/ACRE payments are required by the June 1, 2010, deadline. It is important producers contact their local FSA office to set up appointments **well before** the June 1, 2010, deadline.

Mowing/Spraying CRP Acreage

Wyandot Co. FSA committee needs to provide authorization to CRP participants in 2010 to spot mow or spot spray CRP acreage during the primary nesting season, March 15 - July 15. Spot mowing or spraying authorization applies to maintenance prescribed by the Conservation Plan as well as for control of woody vegetation and noxious weeds **before weed seed development**. Mowing is generally prohibited during primary nesting season for CRP acreage with non-weedy cover. Therefore, CRP established covers which do not contain noxious weeds or woody vegetation are encouraged **not** to be mowed or sprayed. Cosmetic mowing of CRP acreage is discouraged in the interest of protecting wildlife habitat. Monetary per acre penalties can be assessed, if CRP cover is not properly maintained.

First consult your conservation plan, the primary guide when deciding about individual mowing or spraying which pertains to your individual CRP cover. Mowing and spraying could be prescribed by the conservation plan which is developed with the participant along with Natural Resources Conservation Services, District Conservationist. **MOWING OR SPRAYING MAY BE REQUIRED WHEN CONSERVATION PLAN SPECIFIES MOWING/SPRAYING BE COMPLETED FOR THE BENEFIT OF THE PRACTICE AND BEFORE NOXIOUS WEED SEED DEVELOPS.**

EXAMPLE: Grass Waterways must be properly maintained (seeded, mowed, sprayed, etc.) especially in the development phase. For propagation of the waterway cover, this requires mowing or spraying be performed according to a schedule, dis-

couraging weeds from inhibiting desired grass species. Phone 419-294-2127 (FSA) or 419-294-2311 (NRCS) for guidance, especially for filter strips, quail buffers, tree plantings and waterways.

Noxious weeds and woody vegetation must be controlled on CRP acreage and recreational (cosmetic) mowing is prohibited. Prohibited Noxious Weeds in Ohio are the following varieties: **Canada Thistle, Cressleaf Groundsel, Grapevines, Johnson-Grass, Mile-a-Minute Weed, Musk Thistle, Oxeye Daisy, Poison Hemlock, Purple Loosestrife, Russian thistle, Shatter Cane, Wild Carrot, Wild Mustard, & Wild Parsnip**

CRP mowing and spraying restrictions have been implemented to protect wildlife during this critical time period. Please contact FSA at (419) 294-2127, so permission can be on file with your CRP contract **prior to mowing or spraying** CRP acreage.

2009 ACRE Production Reports

Producers who participated in ACRE for 2009 are required to report 2009 production to be used to compute 2009 ACRE payments, if applicable, and 2010 benchmark farm yields. The reporting deadline date for 2009 production reports has been extended **until July 15, 2010** for small grains and other crops. Production reports may be submitted by the 2009 crop year operator, owner or other producer with an interest in the reported acreage. **Failure to file a production report (FSA-658) for a farm enrolled in ACRE will result in the farm's producers being ineligible for ACRE contract payments. Actual yield used to determine future benchmark farm yields will be zero.**

2009 ACRE Benchmark Farm Yields

Producers that participated in the ACRE program for program year 2009 must establish a benchmark farm yield for each covered commodity that was planted. A benchmark farm yield is the Olympic average of the average yield per planted acre for the farm for the 5 most recent crop years. For 2009, the benchmark farm yield is comprised of data from crop years 2004 through 2008. Because of situations where producers did not have control of farms for the preceding 5 years or a specific covered commodity may not have been planted on the farm in 1 or more of the preceding 5 crop years, "plug yields" were established by commodity and county. Producers may use the ACRE plug yield to establish the benchmark farm yield or may report production evidence.

Production must be reported on form FSA-658. Producers will be required to certify, but not submit, the documents to support their production at the time FSA-658 is filed. However, the documentation will be required at a later date to verify the reported production. The production reporting deadlines to establish the 2009 benchmark farm yields has been extended **until July 15, 2010 for small grains and other crops.**

Farm Loans for Socially Disadvantaged

Wyandot County Executive Director, Vicki D. Orians reminds interested applicants that FSA offers loans for farmers to purchase farmland and finance agricultural operations. FSA loan programs are designed to help producers who are temporarily unable to obtain private or commercial credit. In many cases, applicants are beginning farmers who have insufficient net worth to qualify for financing through a commercial lender. In other instances, applicants might have suffered setbacks from natural disasters or might be persons with limited resources.

FSA makes two different types of loans, direct and guaranteed. Farm ownership loans or farm operating loans may be obtained as direct loans for a maximum of up to \$300,000. Guaranteed loans (loans made by a commercial lender where FSA acts as guarantor) can reach a maximum indebtedness of \$1,094,000. Emergency loans are a type of direct loan for farmers who may have suffered physical or production losses in disaster areas designated by a Presidential or Secretarial disaster declaration. Rural Youth Loans, Loans to Beginning Farmers and loans for Socially Disadvantaged Applicants are other types of direct loans also available through FSA.

Socially Disadvantaged Applicants (SDA) are one of a group whose members have been subjected to racial, ethnic or gender prejudice because of their identity as a member of the group without regard to their individual qualities. SDA groups are Women, African Americans, American Indians, Alaskan Natives, Hispanics, Asian Americans and Pacific Islanders. Certain FSA loan funds are targeted to beginning farmers and SDA.

Sign-up For Tree Assistance Program

Orchardists and nursery tree growers may apply to receive Tree Assistance Program (TAP) benefits beginning May 10, 2010, for losses suffered in calendar years **2008 & 2009**, & for losses suffered during **January 1, 2010, to May 7, 2010**. TAP provides financial assistance to qualifying orchardists and nursery tree growers to replant or rehabilitate eligible trees, bushes, and vines that were lost by

natural disasters occurring on or after January 1, 2008, and before October 1, 2011.

- To qualify for TAP, orchardists/nursery tree growers must:
- suffer qualifying tree, bush, and vine losses in excess of 15 % mortality (after adjustment for normal mortality) from an eligible natural disaster for the individual stand
 - have owned the eligible trees, bushes, and vines when the natural disaster occurred; however, eligible growers are not required to own the land on which eligible trees, bushes, and vines are planted
 - replace eligible trees, bushes, vines within 12 months from the date the application is approved.

The following table provides dates on TAP applications:

Calendar Year 2008	July 6, 2010
Calendar Year 2009	July 6, 2010
January 1, 2010, to May 7, 2010	July 6, 2010
May 8, 2010, to September 30, 2011	Within 90 calendar days of the disaster event or date when the loss of trees, bushes, or vines is apparent.

Removing CCC Loan Collateral

Producers are reminded, if you have grain under Commodity Credit Corporation loan, this grain cannot be removed or disposed of without prior county office staff authorization or repayment. The county office staff may issue release authorizations based on a telephone or in person request when you are ready to move the grain or when grain is moved to a wagon or truck. A loan violation is subject to monetary and administrative penalties, such as repaying the loan at principal plus interest, liquidated damages, calling the loan, and/or denial of future farm-stored loans and Loan Deficiency Payments.

All commodity loans are subject to spot check. Locking in a market loan repayment rate is not a marketing authorization. If you are planning to move CCC loan grain, call the county office staff, before you HAUL!

FSA Reminds Producers of Disaster Assistance Payment Limit

The Farm Service Agency (FSA) would like to remind producers that the 2008 Farm Bill provides disaster assistance programs for crop and livestock losses experienced by producers in 2008 and subsequent years with a collective limit of \$100,000 in annual payments. For 2008, this limitation is applied to the “person” as determined for the farming or livestock operation for that program year. For the years 2009 through 2011, this limitation is applied to the individuals and legal entities by direct attribution.

FSA's disaster programs include the Emergency Assistance for Livestock, Honey Bees, and Farm-Raised Fish (ELAP), Livestock Forage Disaster Program (LFP), Livestock Indemnity Program (LIP), and Supplemental Revenue Assistance Payments Program (SURE). Additional limitation information about FSA program payment limitations is available at local FSA offices.

SURE - SUPPLEMENTAL REVENUE ASSISTANCE (DISASTER – 2008) signup for insured producers who had suffered 2008 weather-related crop losses *has no deadline, yet*. Check with the staff at FSA to determine if you qualify with a De Minimis waiver for a crop with less than 5% of expected total farm revenue, or as a socially disadvantaged, a beginning, or limited resource farmer - - none of which require Risk Management Purchase (RMPR). If RMPR is not met, you may file a request for meritorious relief, which needs approval in Washington DC.
