CRP Signup Ends April 15

Farmers and ranchers have until April 15 to enroll eligible land into the Conservation Reserve Program (CRP) during the general sign-up period, which opened earlier this month.

Contracts awarded under this sign-up are scheduled to become effective Oct. 1, 2011. Additionally, current CRP participants with contracts expiring this fall may make new contract offers.

FSA will evaluate and rank eligible CRP offers using an Environmental Benefits Index (EBI) that shows the wildlife, water, soil, and air benefits of enrolling the land in CRP. Decisions on the EBI cutoff will be made after the sign-up ends and after analyzing the EBI data of all the offers.

In addition to the general sign-up, CRP's continuous sign-up program will be ongoing. Continuous acres represent the most environmentally desirable and sensitive land. More information can be found online at: <http://www.fsa.usda.gov/crp>

Producers will need to call the FSA Office to set up an appointment to make their offers for sign up #41.

2011 DCP Signup

Enrollment for the 2011 Direct and Counter-cyclical Program (DCP) will continue through **June 1, 2011**. USDA urges producers to make use of the eDCP automated website to sign up, or producers can visit any USDA Service Center to complete their 2011 DCP contract. USDA computes DCP payments using base acres and payment yields established for each farm. Eligible producers receive direct payments at rates established by statute regardless of market prices. For 2011, eligible producers may request advanced direct payments based on 22 percent of the direct payment.

Crop Reporting for 2011 Crop Year

Crop reporting season is fast approaching. Filing an accurate & timely report for all crops and land uses, including failed and prevented planting acreage, can prevent loss of benefits for a variety of FSA programs. Crop reports are required for LDP and Loan, DCP and ACRE, CRP, NAP, and Disaster program payments. Crop reports, FSA-578, must account for all **cropland** and **non cropland** on a farm, whether idle or planted. **The deadline to timely file 2011 FSA acreage reports is July 1, 2011.** Crops reports filed after July 1st will be charged a late-filed fee.

Non-insured Assistance Program (NAP)

Be sure to contact your local FSA office for the Noninsured Crop Disaster Assistance Program (NAP) filing deadlines for your crops. **July 1st, 2011 is the Deadline for Actual Crop Production for (APH) purposes.**

July 1st, 2010 is the Deadline for Crop reporting on NAP acreages.

Adjusted Gross Income

USDA has a Memorandum of Understanding with the Internal Revenue Service to establish an electronic information exchange process for verifying compliance with the adjusted gross income (AGI) provisions for farm programs. Written consent for the IRS to verify AGI compliance will be required from each producer or payment recipient. No actual tax data will be included in the report that IRS sends to USDA.

The agreement ensures that payments are not issued to producers whose AGI exceeds certain limits. The limits set in the 2008 Farm Bill are \$500,000 nonfarm average AGI for commodity and disaster programs; \$750,000 farm average AGI for direct payments; and \$1 million nonfarm average AGI for conservation programs.

Participants in CCC programs subject to average AGI rules must submit form CCC-927 (Individual) and/or CCC-928 (Legal Entity) to the Internal Revenue Service by June 15. These forms may be obtained from local FSA office or online at: <http://forms.sc.egov.usda.gov/eforms/mainervlet>

Payment Eligibility

Before producers can receive payments, each person must satisfy all other program or payment eligibility requirements including, but not limited to, filing a new farm operation plan or certify to no changes on form CCC-902 E for an entity or form CCC-902 I for an individual, adjusted gross income certification form CCC-926 and an AD-1026 certifying the farm is following an approved conservation system.

Farm Reconstitutions

At FSA, farms are “constituted” to group all tracts having the same owner and the same operator under one farm serial number. When changes in ownership or operation take place, a farm reconstitution is necessary. Another reason is when an owner and operator cannot agree about program participation (for example - ACRE participation).

The reconstitution—or recon—is the process of combining or dividing farms or tracts of land based on the farming operation. Remember, to be effective for the current year, recons must be requested by **August 1, 2011** for farms enrolled in specific programs.

SURE

Signup for the 2009 Supplemental Revenue Assistance Program (SURE) began **Jan. 10, 2011 and runs through July 29, 2011. Please call for an appointment.** SURE provides benefits for farm revenue losses due to natural disasters. For SURE, all crops must be covered by crop insurance, NAP or be eligible for waivers.

A farm enrolled in SURE is eligible when either:

- a portion of the farm is located in a county covered by a qualifying natural disaster declaration (USDA Secretarial Declarations only) or a contiguous county; or,
- the actual production is less than 50% of the normal production.

Sure is available to eligible producers on:

- Farms in counties with Secretarial disaster declarations, including contiguous counties that have incurred crop production losses and/or crop quality losses during the crop year. (Platte County is eligible for the 2009 crop year as Laramie County, WY received a Disaster Designation).
- Any farm in which, for the crop year, the actual production on the farm because of disaster-related conditions is 50% or less than the normal production of the farm.

At a minimum, to be eligible for the Sure Program, the producer must have purchased or be enrolled in the following for the 2009 crop year:

- A plan of crop insurance of at least catastrophic (CAT) level for all insurable crops on all farms.
And/or Non-insured Crop Disaster Assistance Program (NAP) coverage for all non-insurable crops on the farms.

Note: RMA crop Insurance or NAP coverage on grazing land does not have to be purchased in order to be eligible for SURE. Sure does not pay for losses on crops intended for grazing.

In order to receive payments, the farm must suffer at least a 10% eligible production loss on at least one crop of economic significance. Producers with qualifying losses are eligible to receive 60% of the difference between the Sure Disaster Program Guarantee and the actual farm income.

The Disaster Program Guarantee is determined by totaling the calculated guarantee for each crop. For insured crops, the guarantee is based on the level of coverage the producer has elected.

The Total Farm Revenue calculation includes estimated crop value, Crop Insurance Indemnities, NAP payments, Marketing Assistance Loans/LDP, other disaster payments, and DCP payments (15% of Direct Payments plus Counter-cyclical payments and ACRE payments).

Most 2008 Farm Bill disaster assistance programs require a Risk Management Purchase Requirement (RMPR) to be eligible for participation. In most cases, RMPR applies to the whole “farm”. *Under 2008 Farm Bill rules, the “farm” is all farming/ranching interest in all counties in all states.*

RMPR means that eligible producers **must** carry crop insurance on insurable crops (In Wyoming, this includes alfalfa) and NAP insurance on non-insurable crops (native grass hay etc.) Insurable crops must have at least CAT level of coverage.

If you missed the sales closing date for crop insurance or NAP and otherwise qualify for disaster assistance programs, FSA procedure allows you, the producer, to request equitable relief. For equitable relief to be considered by the State Committee, the producer must have made a good faith effort to comply with RMPR requirements.

Producers who failed to meet RMPR requirements for any of the following reasons will not be granted equitable relief

- Intentionally chose not to insure a covered crop under crop insurance or NAP
- Lack of good faith in reporting acreage and/or production
- Ineligibility determinations under RMA or NAP regulations
- Inability to insure acreage because of not paying premiums with crop insurance in a prior year
- Highly erodible and/or wetland, controlled substance violations

Authorized waivers for RMPR are:

- *De Minimis Waiver*
The crop that did not have crop insurance is not economically significant. Economically Significant means any crop that contributed, or is expected to contribute, 5 percent or more of the total expected value of all crops grown by the producer. Crops that add less than 5 percent of the total revenue will meet the waiver requirement.
- *Equitable Relief Waiver*
The program provides for special consideration to provide equitable relief in 2009 to eligible producers who failed to meet 2009 RMPR for SURE. The Wyoming State Committee with a recommendation from the County Committee may grant relief of the RMPR where the:

- producer who met all other SURE requirements, including filing a timely application, inadvertently did not obtain NAP or insurance coverage for a crop (*Producers will be required to submit evidence supporting a conclusion that failure to obtain coverage was inadvertent or accidental.*), and
- State Committee finds that the producer acted in good faith and did not intentionally fail to obtain NAP coverage or insurance, as may be applicable.

If equitable relief is granted the producer will be required to pay the “buy-in” fee in an amount of \$250 per crop to cover an administrative fee and will be determined eligible for SURE payments.

- **SDA / LR / BF**

Producers who are determined Socially Disadvantaged (SDA), Limited Resource (LR), or a Beginning Farmer (BF) are not required to meet the RMPR.

If you don't know if you met RMPR requirements for a particular program, please contact the County Office for more information about your situation.

Equitable relief requests should be submitted to the County Committee in a written format. They should explain which parts of RMPR the producer failed to meet, why RMPR requirements were not met and that you would like to be considered for relief.

Should equitable relief be granted, the producer will be responsible for paying the applicable fees associated with coverage, for program participation purposes only.
