2009 Direct and Counter-cyclical Program Signup

The 2009 Direct and Counter-cyclical Payment (DCP) program for farms with base acres began December 22, 2008 and will continue until June 1, 2009. Farms may not be enrolled after June 1 of the applicable contract period. There are no late filed provisions for contract years 2009-2012.

Commodities covered by DCP include: wheat, corn, grain sorghum, including dual purpose varieties that can be harvested as grain; barley, oats, soybeans, canola, flaxseed, mustard seed, safflower, crambe, sesame seed, rapeseed and sunflowers including oil and non-oil varieties. Pulse crops have been added as an eligible commodity for the 2009 crop year for counter-cyclical payments only. Pulse crops include dry peas, lentils, small chickpeas (Garbanzo bean, Desi), and large chickpeas (Garbanzo bean, Kabuli). Base acreage may not exceed the available DCP cropland acreage on the farm. A producer with the sum of the base acreage on the farm with 10 acres or less must be a minority or limited resource farmer or rancher to be eligible for DCP payments. Reconstitutions of farms with 10 base acres or less are now allowed.

Direct and Counter-cyclical payments for the 2009 year will be made on 83.3 percent of the farm's base acreage. Final direct payments will be issued in October 2009.

Direct payment rates are:

Barley	\$0.24/bu
Corn	\$0.28/bu
Grain Sorghum	\$0.35/bu
Oats	\$0.024/bu
Other Oilseeds	\$0.80/cwt
Soybeans	\$0.44/bu
Wheat	\$0.52/bu

Planting flexibility is allowed but includes planting restrictions for fruits and vegetables on base acreage without farm or producer history. To maintain eligibility: 1) meet Highly Erodible Land and Wetland provisions requirements; 2) report all cropland acres; 3) meet actively engaged in farming and person determination requirements; and 4) comply with adjusted gross income provisions. Payment limitation amounts are \$40,000 for direct payments and \$65,000 for counter-cyclical payments.

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Secretarial Designations – Eligibility for Disaster Programs

Fifteen Montana counties were declared primary natural disaster areas during the period beginning January 1, 2008 and continuing.

The disaster designation has an important significance in those counties as it allows eligible producers within those 15 counties and contiguous counties to participate in the Supplemental Revenue Assistance Program (SURE). SURE was one of the disaster programs created under the 2008 Farm Bill. It provides financial assistance for crop production and or quality losses due to a natural disaster. Two triggers make the program available:

- A Secretarial Disaster designation **and** at least a 10 percent crop production loss on at least one crop of economic significance which is defined as a crop which is expected to contribute at least 5 percent of the farm's income (Nationwide); or
- In the absence of a secretarial disaster declaration, farms in which the actual production on the farm is less than 50 percent of the normal production on the farm. Producers in counties that did not receive a secretarial declaration or contiguous county declaration have only

Secretarial Designations – Eligibility for Disaster Programs (cont.)

SURE requires that all crops in all counties in the nation be included on one application regardless if only one county received a secretarial declaration.

In addition, producers must have crop insurance of Non-Insured Crop Disaster Assistance Program (NAP) coverage for all crops excluding grazing lands. SURE does not pay for losses on crops intended for grazing. **Signup for SURE is unknown at this time.**

NAP Deadline March 16

For the 2009 crop year it is imperative to purchase Non-insured Crop Disaster Assistance Program (NAP) and catastrophic (CAT) level of crop insurance for all insurable and non-insurable crops. This is not only for production coverage but also for eligibility for the new permanent disaster programs created in the 2008 Farm Bill.

In order for producers to be **eligible** for assistance under the Supplemental Revenue Assistance (**SURE**) Program and the Emergency Assistance for Livestock, and Honey Bees, (**ELAP**), and the Tree Assistance Program (**TAP**) producers must obtain a plan of insurance for each insurable and non-insurable commodity on the farm, **excluding grazing**. To be eligible for assistance under the Livestock Forage Program (**LFP**) producers must obtain either coverage under the Pasture, Rangeland, and Forage Rainfall Index Pilot Program through crop insurance, or NAP coverage, or both on their grazing land.

Producers must file the required paperwork and pay the administrative fee by the NAP closing date of **March 16, 2009** for all crops except value-loss and honey. The deadline for value-loss and honey for 2009 has passed.

Please contact the office to ensure your eligibility for the new disaster assistance programs by March 16th.

Changes to FSA Payment Processing

FSA will be deploying a new payment processing system the first part of December.

Through the new system, all payments made through direct deposit will be processed through the Federal Reserve Bank and will be received in the participants account within 2-3 days of processing.

New Loan Interest Rates Provided

The interest rate for Marketing Assistance Grain loans changed at the beginning of 2009. The interest rate is 1.625%. This rate will stay in effect until the loan is paid in full.

Wildlife Escape Ramps

Wildlife escape ramps are a critical part of your livestock watering facilities. Many animals like birds, bats and small mammals will drown in your water tanks unless they have an obvious escape route. Watering tanks that do not have escape routes result in the trapped animal swimming around the perimeter of the tank until exhausted and eventually drowning. Not only is this bad for wildlife but it will also foul the drinking water for your livestock. It is important that the ramp material have "holes" and that it touch the sides of the tank. NRCS now requires these escape ramps on all watering facilities that will be cost shared by them. Escape ramps must flare from each edge to contact the sides of the tank so that trapped animals are forced to make contact with the ramp as they swim around the perimeter of the tank. The maximum slope is 1:1 and the ramps must reach the bottom of the tank. The following is a design for a Wildlife Escape Ramp and is a suggestion for construction.

Materials: 10-14 Gauge, flattened or regular expanded metal. Recommended flattened expanded metal ¾" - #9.

Cost for eight ladders: \$45-\$60. Approx. 2.5 hours.

1. Torch cut eight 24" x 24" squares.
2. Make a template of the cutout areas and mark the cut lines with permanent marker or soapstone.
3. Torch cut the lines.
4. Mark the bend lines. Use a tin break or bend over a metal edge using a hammer. Bend at a 45° angle.
5. Leave the hook flat for ease of transport & storage. At installation, use a hammer to bend the hook over the rim of the stock tank.
6. Paint with a rust resistant, non-toxic neutral color. Two coats.

The deadline to signup for the Crop Disaster Program (CDP) will end **February 27, 2009**. The deadline date applies to both quantity and quality provisions of CDP.

The FSA-840 (Crop Disaster Program application) and all supporting documentation must be received in the FSA county office by the close of business on February 27, 2009. Late-filed applications will not be approved following the February 27th deadline.

Signup for the program began October 15, 2007 for crop years 2005-2007.

FSA Hiring Additional Loss Adjusters

FSA is currently accepting offers from new individuals interested in providing contracted crop adjusting services for the 2009 crop year. Applications for the 2009 crop year are due March 1 to the Montana State FSA Office.

Loss Adjusters perform loss adjustment and program services as assigned by FSA. Some duties included in those services are: 1) visiting farms to inspect damaged or destroyed crops; 2) appraise potential crop production; 3) determine and verify the cause and time of loss; 4) determine farm-stored production; 5) visit FSA offices and/or farms to perform inspections, reviews or other loss services.

Starting pay for new adjusters is \$10.00/hour. A pay raise will be received after full certification on at least one crop is received. All equipment necessary to perform loss-adjusting activities will be provided by FSA. Mileage and per diem will also be paid by FSA. Contracted adjusters are expected to provide their own mode of transportation.

All applications are to be sent to the Montana Farm Service Agency, Attention Leonard McArthur, PO Box 670, Bozeman, MT 59771. All applications postmarked by **March 1, 2009** will be reviewed and selections made based on the need of the area, work experience, agriculture background and availability.
