3/ For 2006, this is the estimated direct payments to be received for 2006 crops less what the CCC reported as advanced payments for 2006 crops received in 2005. Also the 2006 estimate assumes that 7 percent of program participants will receive 50 percent of the estimated 2007 crop direct payment as advance payments.

4/ The 2005 payment includes the 1st partial payment for 2005 crops. The rest of the 2005 crop counter-cyclical payments are to be received in 2006. The 2006 estimate also assumes that 60 percent of program participants receive 35 percent of the estimated 2006 crop counter-cyclical as first partial payments.

5/ In publications prior to May of 2001, marketing loan gains were included in cash receipts rather than in government payments in the farm sector income accounts.

6/ The Tobacco Transition Payment Program will provide payments over a ten-year period to quota holders and producers of quota tobacco. Payments are made to eligible quota holders and producers. The Credit Commodity Corporation will not make lump-sum payments, but a third party may. The private party enters into an agreement with the quota holder or producer is to receive a lump-sum payment from them in return for the individual's rights to TTPP payments. The estimates here include TTPP payments and lump-sum payments to quota holders and producers. The TTPP payments to private parties are not included.

7/ This category includes all conservation programs except for those considered as emergency assistance such as the Emergency Conservation Program. This is a change from the last release where Emergency Conservation Program was included. In publications prior to July 2003, this category only included payments to Conservation Reserve Program, Agricultural Conservation Program, Emergency Conservation Program, and Great Plains Program.

8/ This category includes all programs providing disaster and emergency assistance payments to growers. This is a change from the last release where conservation programs which provided emergency assistance were included in the conservation program payment category. In publications prior to July 2003, the category Emergency Assistance included only emergency assistance payments attributed to supplemental legislation.

9/ Miscellaneous programs and provisions vary from year to year. In publications prior to July 2003, this category included some program payments which are now considered either as either Conservation or Ad Hoc and Emergency. Also included here are CCP--Fruit and Vegetable Violation, CCP--Late Fees, and CCP--Payment Limitation Over payments which could not be directly linked to either Direct or Counter-cyclical Program payments.

Assist agricultural producers and landowners in achieving a high level of stewardship of soil, water, air, and wildlife resources on America's farms and ranches while protecting the human and natural environment.

Conservation Reserve Program (CRP)

The CRP was authorized by the Food Security Act of 1985 to provide farm and ranch owners, operators, and tenants a voluntary long-term land retirement program. Initially, the CRP emphasized soil erosion. In 1990, Congress extended the CRP enrollment period and broadened the program's focus. The CRP's objectives expanded to include improving water quality, turning marginal pasture land into riparian areas, increasing wildlife habitat, and other environmental goals of growing importance to the American public. In 1995, FSA initiated "continuous" sign ups to allow certain high-priority conservation practices that yield highly desirable environmental benefits to be offered and accepted at any time.

Kentucky has 16,620 contracts protecting 356,827 acres. Kentucky producers received **\$29,646,787** under CRP during FY 2006 making the state the 20th largest recipient of CRP funds nationally.

Continuous Sign up

Producers with eligible lands may enroll certain high priority conservation practices, such as filter strips and riparian buffers, at any time during the year without competition. In addition to annual rental payments and cost-share assistance, many practices are eligible for additional annual and one-time up-front financial incentives.

CRP Re-enrollment

CRP participants, with contracts expiring between 2007 and 2010, were recently given the opportunity to re-enroll or extend their contracts. Kentucky has 236,593 CRP acres that will expire between 2007 and 2010.

Conservation Reserve Enhancement Program (CREP)


Under the Conservation Reserve Enhancement Program (CREP), Federal/State and local partnerships implement projects designed to address specific environmental objectives through targeted CRP enrollments. Sign-up is held on a continuous basis. In 2001, USDA and the Commonwealth of Kentucky agreed to implement a CREP on a section of the Green River to restore up to 100,000 acres.

CREP is the new generation of agricultural conservation programs. Designed to respond to the needs of the environment while addressing the conservation objectives of the landowner, CREP is truly a unique concept. CREP is the Commonwealth's largest conservation program. Never before has there been a program that allows landowners to benefit to this degree through the application of environmentally sound conservation practices.

CREP projects are enhanced programs designed for areas with sensitive and unique natural resources. Kentucky's Green River Watershed is one of the most biologically diverse river systems in the country. There is a significant amount of agriculture within this watershed that, at times, adversely affects the water quality. The Green River CREP is the most lucrative conservation program ever to come to the Commonwealth of Kentucky. The Green River CREP project includes 917,197 acres in the counties of Adair, Barren, Edmonson, Green, Hart, Metcalfe, Russell and Taylor. An expansion of the conservation program was approved in October 2006 to include the Green River Watershed from Mammoth Cave National Park to its confluence with the Barren River. The new area includes all or parts of Allen, Barren, Butler, Edmonson, Grayson, Hart, Logan, Metcalfe, Simpson and Warren Counties. Previously, only portions of Barren, Edmonson, Hart and Metcalfe were included in the CREP Program.

At the end of FY 2006, there were **102** contracts covering **1,683** acres under CREP.



Conservation Reserve Enhancement Program (CREP) Green River Project



This field of Native Grasses on the Barren River Lake was established to enhance environmental benefits including water surface runoff and wildlife habitat.

If needed for the successful establishment of the practice cost share is available for livestock crossings.



This is a new native grass planting. These types of plantings are eligible in conjunction with stream buffers. Buffers of 3rd order or larger streams are eligible for up to 1000' width in the CREP area.

Conservation Reserve Enhancement Program (CREP)



This sinkhole is eligible to be enrolled in a Marginal Pastureland Wildlife Habitat Buffer. Benefits include improvement of subsurface water quality while restoring and enhancing wildlife habitat.



This is a planting of Native grasses and forbs. These types of planting may be utilized for whole field enrollments as well as on most buffer practices.



Grassed waterways are often planted on non agricultural lands to reduce sediment runoff and improve the quality of water and wildlife habitat, including threatened and endangered species.



Riparian Buffers may be applied on cropland or marginal pastureland situations to enhance water quality and wildlife habitat.

Crop Disaster Program (CDP)

The most recent CDP provided assistance for losses in the 2005 crop year, that resulted from damages and losses caused by severe storms, including high winds, tornadoes and excessive rainfall. To qualify for reimbursement, the damages must be in excess of 35 percent for the loss of production and 20 percent for quality. As a condition of receiving benefits under CDP, any producer who fails to purchase crop insurance and/or NAP coverage, will be required to refund the full amount of the CDP payment for the crop, plus interest.



Kentucky producers who suffered losses to agricultural commodities due to damaging weather or related conditions during 2005 crop year were reimbursed **\$1,331,922** in FY 2006.

Noninsured Assistance Program (NAP)

NAP provides financial assistance to producers of noninsurable crops when low yields, loss of inventory, or prevented planting occurs due to natural disasters. This program covers noninsurable crop losses and planting prevented by disasters. Eligible crops include commercial crops and other agricultural commodities produced for food (including livestock feed) or fiber for which the catastrophic level of crop insurance is unavailable. Also eligible for NAP coverage are controlled environmental crops (mushrooms and floriculture), speciality crops (honey and maple sap), and value loss crops (aquaculture, Christmas trees, ginseng, ornamental nursery crops and turf grass sod).

In FY 2006, Kentucky producers received **\$770,950** under the NAP.

Emergency Conservation Program (ECP)

The Emergency Conservation Program (ECP) provides emergency cost-share funding for farmers to rehabilitate farmland damaged by natural disasters that create new conservation problems. The assistance may be used for removing debris from farmland; grading, shaping and re leveling farmland; and restoring livestock fences. Kentucky paid producers **\$463,416** in FY 2006 to help restore farmland damaged by natural disasters.

The Direct and Counter-cyclical Program helps to stabilize U.S. agriculture by providing payments to eligible producers who enroll their farm each fiscal year during the lift of the current farm bill. In FY 2006, Kentucky farmers received **\$ 95,878,294** in Direct Program payments.

Provides farm income support to eligible producers, cooperatives, and associations to help improve the economic stability and viability of the agricultural sector, and to ensure the production of an adequate and reasonably priced supply of food and fiber.

Market Gains and Loan Deficiency Payments (LDP)



Producers who agree to forgo a marketing assistance loan may obtain a Loan Deficiency Payment (LDP). Kentucky producers received **\$44,855,127** in market loan gains and LDP's in FY 2006.

For a crop to be eligible for an LDP, the producer must have beneficial interest in the commodity, in addition to meeting all eligibility requirements.

LDP provisions are active when the alternative re-

payment rate for the commodity at a given location is less than the base loan rate at the same location.

Milk Income Loss Contract Program (MILC)



MILC compensates dairy producers when domestic milk prices fall below a specified level. The Agricultural Reconciliation Act of 2005 reauthorized the program through September 30, 2007. The extended program period is called MILCX. The program has no set funding level. The MILC program is available to producers on dairy operations throughout the U.S. if the dairy operation produces and commercially markets milk during the period of December 1, 2001 – September 30, 2005. In FY 2006,

Kentucky dairy operators received **\$4,517,988** to help compensate for low milk prices.

Market Assistance Loans

Marketing assistance loans provide producers interim financing at harvest time to meet cash flow needs without having to sell their commodities when market prices are typically at harvest-time lows. For crop year 2006, Kentucky made **638** loans for **\$44,446,198**.

Farm Storage Facility Loan Program

Under the Commodity Credit Corporate (CCC) Charter Act, FSA may make loans to producers to build or upgrade farm storage and handling facilities. Storage structures for commercial purposes (the storage of grain for others, whether paid or unpaid) are ineligible for loans, as are portable handling or drying equipment and portable or permanent weigh scales. The maximum term of a farm loan is seven years. In FY 2006, **\$1,135,415** were loaned to Kentucky farmers.

Tobacco Transition Payment Program (TTPP)

On October 22, 2005, President Bush signed the American Jobs Creation Act of 2004, which included the Fair and Equitable Tobacco Reform, commonly referred to as the “Tobacco Buyout.” FSA is charged with administering the program, titled the Tobacco Transition Payment Program (TTPP).

TTPP provides payments to tobacco quota holders and tobacco producers beginning in 2005 and ending in 2014. On January 16, 2007, Farm Service Agency (FSA) began issuing the third round of TTPP payments

to eligible quota holders and producers. Quota holders and producers are permitted, at their option, to transfer their payments to third parties through two different mechanism: assignments of payments and successor-in-interest contracts. Assignments are revocable only by the assignee; the assignor retains all rights and obligations under the contract. Successor-in-interest contracts facilitate lump-sum payments to quota holders or producers.

In FY 2006, FSA paid **\$200,344,566** to Kentucky tobacco quota holders and producers under TTPP.

FSA makes and guarantees loans, and provides credit counseling and supervision to farmers who are temporarily unable to obtain private commercial credit. FSA loan applicants are often beginning farmers who do not qualify for conventional loans because of insufficient net worth, or established farmers who have suffered financial setbacks from natural disasters or economic down turns.

FSA offers Direct Loans to those unable to qualify for a Guaranteed Loan. Under the Guaranteed Loan Program, FSA guarantees loans made by commercial agricultural lenders for up to 95 percent of any loss. During FY 2006, Kentucky FSA county offices maintains a total of **7,427** loans for **\$378,169,467** to producers.



Three critical data sets are being modernized through using GIS and GPS in FSA County Offices and USDA Service Centers:

- Aerial Imagery
- Common Land Unit
- Soils




Aerial Imagery: Kentucky was flown for 1-meter leaf on true color imagery during the 2004 growing season. Counties are updating farm records using this new base layer imagery. In 2006 Kentucky was flown for 2-meter leaf on true color imagery for acreage and compliance determinations. The goals of the National Agricultural Imagery Program are to collect 1 and 2 meter natural color and color infrared imagery for the entire continental United States on a five year refresh cycle and deliver the imagery in the year of acquisition.

Common Land Unit: The Common Land Unit (CLU) data set represents all field boundaries. Each CLU is linked to a unique set of characteristics that include a farm number, tract numbers, field numbers, land use code, highly erodible land status, and field acreage.

In order to achieve the goals set forth by the President's Management Agenda and the USDA's Strategic Plan for FY 2005-2010, FSA in Kentucky will operate under principles and values that demonstrate a commitment to dignity and respect for all customers, both external and internal. To ensure that all customers, especially small, limited resource, socially disadvantaged and underserved are fully aware of, and have the opportunity to participate in FSA programs and county committee elections, Kentucky FSA is taking a proactive position on outreach.

Kentucky FSA is an active member in a number of organizations at the state and local level that promote issues related to agriculture. FSA customers are both internal and external. Here are some examples of FSA's outreach projects throughout the Commonwealth:



Minority Ag Conference: The Lincoln County FSA Office held its first annual Women and Minority Ag Conference in October. The event, **"Keeping the Family Farm"** attracted more than 76 local producers and Ag business owners, with more than two-thirds of the attendees being from targeted groups.



Food Drive: The Grayson County FSA Office partnered with NRCS, RD, the Conservation District and 25 local churches to collect over 5,000 pounds of nonperishable food items as part of the 10th annual "Harvest of the Heart" food drive held in November. The food was delivered to the local food pantry that serves more than 700 Grayson County families in their food and nutrition needs.

County Committee Elections: FSA County Offices continue to promote diversity of nominees and members of the local County Committees. In 2006, there was a 10% increase in female candidates elected to the local county committee. A special election newsletter was mailed to all producers of record announcing the areas (LAA's) holding elections. This is an outreach effort to achieve a more diverse representation of the agricultural community.



Newsletters: Kentucky FSA NEWS is published quarterly. The newsletter provides FSA producers with the latest information on programs and services FSA has to offer. The newsletter is mailed directly to all FSA producers in Kentucky. The newsletter is also used by County offices as an outreach tool in their local community.



Women in Agriculture: FSA is a proud supporter of Kentucky Women in Agriculture. The mission of this proactive group of women involved in Kentucky Agriculture is to empower women through education, involvement, and action. The goals of this organization include: promoting agriculture in Kentucky, creating a cooperative feeling among women in agriculture and striving for good fellowship and integrity of membership. Approximately 170 were in attendance.



Farm Machinery Show: FSA participated in the 41st Annual National Farm Machinery (NFMS) show in Louisville, February 15-18. FSA was one of the 800 exhibitors at the show. FSA showcased 20 years of the Conservation Reserve Program (CRP). Farmers from across the nation and Canada stopped by the booth to discuss a wide range of FSA programs from REX letters, eLDP options and TTPP contracts.



The NFMS is one of the largest farm shows in the nation with over 300,000 in attendance.

Youth Ag Days: FSA County Offices participates regularly in local Youth Ag Days. Hopkins County FSA participated in the youth ag day for 5th graders. The topic was Farm Safety which included topics on equipment safety and grain bin safety. Approximately 250 students attended the event.

Similar events were held in Livingston, Crittenden, Bracken, Mason and Robertson Counties.



Small Limited Resource Farmer Conference: Kentucky FSA, in partnership with Kentucky State University, and other USDA and State Agency's sponsored the annual Small Limited Resource Minority Farmers Conference, on November 14-16 in Frankfort. This year's theme was "*Opportunities in Agriculture: Looking to Your Future*". Participating farmers had the opportunity to tour agricultural sites, hear inspiring success stories, risk management, and information on pending legislation.

FSA Programs Displayed at County Fair: Lewis/Greenup County FSA participated in the 60th anniversary of the county fair. FSA displayed an informational exhibit for the week long event and took home 3rd place. The display included various photos of local farms and fliers that highlighted programs such as Direct and Counter Cyclical Payment (DCP); Non Insured Crop Disaster Assistance Program (NAP); Farm Stored Facility Loans (FSFL); Conservation Reserve Program (CRP); Tobacco Transition Payment Program (TTPP); Marketing Assistance Loans (MAL); Loan Deficiency Payments (LDP's); Operating Loans (OL); Milk Income Loss Contract Extension Program (MILCX); Crop Reporting and Ad Hoc Disaster Programs.
