NEW DISASTER PROGRAMS

On May 25, 2007, President Bush signed into law the “U.S. Troop Readiness, Veteran’s Care, Katrina Recovery, and Iraq Accountability Appropriations Act, 2007 (2007 Act). The 2007 Act provides approximately \$3 billion in agricultural disaster aid for America’s farmers and ranchers.

Specifically, the 2007 Act provides funds for a **Crop Disaster Program, Livestock Indemnity Program, Livestock Compensation Program, Emergency Conservation Program, and Dairy Disaster Assistance Program**. This Newsletter summarizes the disaster aid programs of the 2007 Act.

Crop Disaster Program Signup

The **Crop Disaster Program (CDP)** provides benefits to farmers who suffered quantity and quality losses to 2005, 2006, or 2007 crops. CDP signup for quantity losses began on October 15, 2007. USDA will announce and conduct CDP sign-up for quality losses as soon as possible.

Losses from natural disasters may qualify for financial assistance if the crop was planted before February 28, 2007, or, in the case of prevented plantings, for crops that would have been planted before February 28, 2007. Producers who incurred qualifying losses in 2005, 2006 or 2007 can and should apply for benefits for every year and will be paid the highest dollar amount. The calculation is complex; prices for insurable crops are not the same between all three years, eligibility may not be the same for all three years. Participants may apply for loss benefits on multiple commodities as long as the losses occurred in the same crop year.

Only producers who obtained crop insurance coverage or coverage under the Noninsured Crop Disaster Assistance Program for the year of loss will be eligible for CDP benefits. Producers must have suffered quantity losses in excess of 35%. For most crops, the calculation will compare the production amount to the higher of the county yield or the producer’s actual production history. The amount of loss in excess of 35% will be eligible for quantity payments at 42% of the payment rate.

In addition to quantity loss payments, payments for quality reductions due to eligible conditions in excess of 25% may be provided. To receive quality payments, producers must suffer an economic loss to quality-affected production of at least 25% of the expected value.



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Livestock Indemnity Program

Did you lose any livestock between January 1, 2005 and February 28, 2007 as a result of a disaster event, such as excessive moisture in 2005 or excessive heat in July of 2006? If so, you may be eligible for federal financial assistance.



The ***Livestock Indemnity Program (LIP)*** compensates livestock producers for livestock losses between January 1, 2005, and February 28, 2007, that resulted from natural disasters.

To be eligible for LIP, a livestock producer must have legally owned the eligible livestock on the day the livestock died. The livestock must have died in an eligible county as a result of an eligible disaster event. The following are among the eligible livestock under LIP: dairy cattle, beef cattle, buffalo, beefalo, catfish, crawfish, equine, sheep, goats, swine, poultry, and deer. The livestock must not have been produced for reasons other than commercial farming.

Signup for LIP began on September 10, 2007. An ending signup date has not been established.

Applicants must provide adequate proof that the eligible livestock deaths occurred in an eligible county as a direct result of an eligible disaster event during the applicable disaster period. The quantity and kind of livestock that died as a direct result of the eligible disaster event may be documented by rendering truck receipts or certificates, veterinarian records, IRS records, or any other documentation to verify the losses.

If a livestock owner does not have adequate proof of death, FSA will accept certifications of livestock deaths by third parties and the livestock owner. The certifications must be a written, signed, and dated statement.

Producers may receive a maximum of \$80,000 in LIP benefits.

Livestock Compensation Program

The ***Livestock Compensation Program (LCP)*** compensates livestock producers for feed losses on non-irrigated grazing land resulting from natural disasters occurring between Jan.1, 2005, and Feb. 28, 2007.

Producers in primary or contiguous counties declared secretarial disaster areas or counties declared

presidential disaster areas between January 1, 2005, and February 28, 2007, are eligible. Producers incurring a loss in more than one of the 2005, 2006 or 2007 calendar years must choose only one year for which they want to receive benefits.

Signup for LCP began on September 10, 2007. An ending signup date has not been established.

The following are among the types of livestock operations that will be eligible for LCP: dairy cattle, beef cattle, buffalo, beefalo, equine, poultry, elk, reindeer, sheep, goats, swine or deer.

Producers will not be penalized if they reduced the average number of livestock they owned for grazing during the production year for which assistance is being provided. Producers may receive a maximum of \$80,000 in LCP benefits.

Emergency Conservation Program

Avocado/citrus producers who suffered severe damage to their orchards due to the January 2007 freeze may be eligible for assistance under the ***Emergency Conservation Program (ECP)***.



This ECP program, which is administered by the Farm Service Agency, provides cost-share assistance to producers who have completed or will complete abnormal heavy pruning, tree removal, and stumping in their orchard. This includes debris removal. The damage must be a result of the January freeze.

Producers qualifying for ECP assistance may receive cost-share levels up to 75 percent of the eligible cost not to exceed \$250 per acre. No producer is eligible for more than \$200,000 cost-sharing per natural disaster occurrence.

The sign-up period for this ECP program starts **November 1, 2007** and ends on **December 31, 2007**.

To be eligible for an ECP payment, all work must be completed by the end of the sign-up period. No extensions will be granted for this ECP program.

Also, to be eligible the damage must be so costly to rehabilitate that Federal assistance is or will be needed and affects the productive capacity of the farmland.

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Dairy Disaster Assistance Program

The *Dairy Disaster Assistance Program (DDAP)* provides \$16 million in benefits to dairy producers for dairy production losses.



Producers in primary or contiguous counties declared secretarial disaster areas or counties declared presidential disaster areas between January 1, 2005, and February 28, 2007, may be eligible.

FSA will announce and conduct a sign-up for DDAP as soon as possible. Producers will be able to enroll in DDAP at their local FSA Service Center. Keep an eye on future FSA Newsletters for additional DDAP provisions and the announcement of a sign-up period.

NONINSURED CROP DISASTER ASSISTANCE PROGRAM (NAP) DEADLINES APPROACHING

Deadlines for the 2008 Non-insured Crop Disaster Assistance Program (NAP) coverage are fast approaching.



The NAP program provides financial assistance to producers on non-insurable crops when low yields, loss of inventory, or prevented planting occur due to a natural disaster. To be eligible for NAP assistance, crops must be non-insurable crops and agricultural commodities for which catastrophic risk protection level of crop insurance is not available.

At the time of application, producers must pay a nonrefundable service fee for the eligible NAP crop by the application closing date. The cost is \$100 per crop per producer with a \$300 cap per county, not to exceed \$900 per producer.

The 2008 application closing dates for Los Angeles, Orange, and San Bernardino counties are summarized for the specific crops as shown below:

Once a NAP application (CCC-471 form) is approved by the County FSA Office, it provides continuous coverage and will remain in effect for each crop year unless the producer elects to cancel the coverage or fails to pay the application administrative fees before the application closing date.

AGRICULTURE CENSUS INFORMATION ONLINE

The USDA's National Agricultural Statistics Service has launched a web site to provide producers with news and information on the upcoming census. The site is located at <http://www.agcensus.usda.gov/>.

According to NASS, the Census site is part of their ongoing effort to accommodate the growing number of farmers and ranchers that are using the Internet. This year will mark the first time that producers have the option of filling out their Census forms online, saving both time and postage costs.

The Census of Agriculture is taken every five years, gathering information about every farm and ranch in the nation and the people who operate them. A variety of topics are covered and the Census provides comprehensive agricultural data for every county. Forms will be mailed to producers in late December that will include directions for responding online. Census forms are due by Feb. 4, 2008.
