

FSA At Work Across Massachusetts - FY 2010



The USDA Farm Service Agency delivered over \$6.7 million in federal program payments to Massachusetts farmers and ranchers during FY 2010. Massachusetts agriculture benefits greatly from the tireless efforts of our dedicated employees and locally elected County Committees.

Commodity Program Payments: \$952,857

Massachusetts producers benefited from commodity and price support program payments during FY 2010.

\$332,037 - Direct and Counter Cyclical Program (DCP) Direct payments provide income support to producers of eligible commodities based on production history (acreage and yields) and do not depend on the current production choices. Counter-cyclical payments are made when the effective price for eligible commodities is less than the target price.

\$578,000 - Milk Income Loss Contract (MILC) provides compensation to dairy producers when domestic milk prices fall below a specified level.

\$42,820 - Average Crop Revenue Election Program (ACRE) provides producers a revenue based payment as an alternative to commodity price based counter-cyclical payments.



Conservation: \$2,234,057

FSA continues to make strides toward conserving and improving soil, water, and wildlife resources in Massachusetts. The Conservation Reserve Program is the USDA's single largest, most effective environmental program. Conservation investments for Massachusetts in FY 2010 include:

\$1,219,248 - Emergency Conservation Program (ECP) provides emergency funding for farmers and ranchers to rehabilitate farmland damaged by natural disasters, and to carry out emergency water conservation measures during periods of severe drought.

\$990,090 - Biomass Crop Assistance Program (BCAP) assists land owners and operators with the collection, harvest, storage and transportation of eligible material used in a biomass conversion facility.

\$22,843 - Grassland Reserve Program (GRP) is a voluntary program designed to protect grasslands from conversion to cropland. Producer rental payments provide an incentive to maintain pastures for grazing.

\$1,876 - Conservation Reserve Program (CRP) provides financial incentives, cost-share and rental payments to producers who convert highly erodible cropland or environmentally sensitive acreage to long-term vegetative cover.



Disaster Assistance: \$3,570,475

From drought to flood, freeze to tornadoes and hurricanes - no production agriculture operation is immune to the effects of natural disasters. Massachusetts FSA was financially responsive to the state's producers.

\$1,557,169 - Supplemental Revenue Assistance Program (SURE) provides payments to producers when farm revenue losses are due to natural disasters.

\$1,075,989 - Non-Insured Crop Disaster Assistance Program (NAP) - FSA's NAP program provides financial assistance to producers of noninsurable crops when low yields, loss of inventory, or prevented planting occurs due to natural disasters.

\$202,124 - Emergency Assistance Program provides emergency relief to producers of livestock, honey bees, and farm-raised fish. This compensation covers losses resulting from natural disasters like blizzards and wildfires.

\$735,193 - Dairy Economic Loss Assistance Program (DELAP) provided a one-time payment to assist dairy producers that suffered low milk prices and high production costs.



Farm Loans: \$15.8 million

FSA obligated \$15,798,000 in direct and guaranteed operating loans, farm ownership loans, emergency loans, youth loans, socially disadvantaged loans, and loans to beginning farmers throughout Massachusetts.

\$8,019,000 - Guaranteed Loans - FSA guarantees loans made by conventional agricultural lenders for up to 95 percent of any loss if the loan fails. In FY 2010, FSA in Massachusetts guaranteed 36 farm ownership and farm operating loans.

\$7,779,000 - Direct Loans - FSA provides assistance to those unable to obtain guaranteed loans. In FY 2010, FSA in Massachusetts funded 110 farm ownership and farm operating loans.

\$2,068,000 - Socially Disadvantaged Loans - In FY 2010, 26 socially disadvantaged loans were made by FSA in Massachusetts.

\$3,318,000 - Beginning Farmer Loans - In FY 2010, 48 beginning farmer loans were made in Massachusetts.

\$5,000 - Youth Loans - In FY 2010 a rural youth in Massachusetts was provided a low interest loan.
