FSA County Committee Election

The election of agricultural producers in LAA-1, which consists of **Stoney Creek, Saulston, New Hope and Indian Springs**, to Farm Service Agency (FSA) county committee is important to ALL farmers and ranchers with large or small operations. It is crucial that every eligible producer participate in these elections because FSA county committees are a direct link between the agricultural community and the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

Committee members are a critical component of the operations of FSA. They help deliver FSA farm programs at the local level. Farmers who serve on committees help with the decisions necessary to administer the programs their counties offer. They work to make FSA agricultural programs serve the needs of local producers. Committees provide local input on: Commodity price support loans and payments; establishment of allotments and yields; conservation programs; incentive, indemnity, and disaster payments for some commodities; and other farm disaster assistance.

Election Period - Nomination period began **June 1, 2007** and ends **August 1, 2007**. Nomination forms for the 2007 election must be postmarked or received by close of business in the local FSA county office on August 1, 2007.

Nominations - A nomination form signed by the nominee is needed to nominate an individual. The form includes a statement that the nominee agrees to serve if elected. The nomination form (FSA-669A) is available at your local FSA county office and online at: <http://www.fsa.usda.gov/pas/publications/elections>

Agricultural producers who participate or cooperate in an FSA program may be nominated for candidacy for the committee. Individuals may nominate themselves or others as a candidate. In addition, organizations representing socially disadvantaged (minorities and women) farmers or ranchers may nominate candidates.

Ballots will be mailed to eligible voters in LAA-1, which consists of **Stoney Creek, Saulston, New Hope and Indian Springs** townships, by **November 3, 2007**, and must be returned to the FSA county office or postmarked by **December 4, 2007**.

Who Can Vote - Agricultural producers of legal voting age can vote if they participate or cooperate in any FSA program. A person who is not of legal voting age, but supervises and conducts the farming operations on an entire farm can also vote. Check with your local FSA office for voting requirements and eligibility.

CCC-633-EZ Reminder

Remember, we’ve switched to the CCC-633-EZ form. It’s a one size fits all form you can use to indicate your intentions to receive loan deficiency payments for all your crops at the beginning of the crop year, long before you’ve lost beneficial interest.

The same form is then used to submit a request for an LDP any time during the loan/LDP availability period before or after losing beneficial interest. For the 2007 crop year, the CCC-633 EZ and eLDP online requests are the **only methods** available to request LDPs. Contact the county office staff for details.

Crop Reporting

The Wayne County Farm Service Agency reminds all farmers that July 2, 2007 deadline is for reporting tobacco, peanuts, corn, cotton, sorghum, soybeans, fruits, vegetables and all other cropland. Producers participating in the Direct and Counter-Cyclical program must file an acreage report on all the cropland on the farm. All Noninsured Crop Disaster Assistance Program (NAP) crops that are planted or growing after May 15, 2007 should also be reported.

Planting dates are required for all annual planted crops. This information must be the same information furnished to federal crop for crop insurance reporting.

It is important to start reporting crops as early as possible in order to prevent long lines. The following are options for giving crop reports:

1. Producers make an appointment and visit the office, identify crops with assistance from office staff, and waits to sign the computer generated report. This method is used most often.
2. Producers make an appointment and visit the office to complete maps with assistance from our staff. The operator leaves while the crop report is loaded in the computer, then returns to sign the report. The report must be signed before the applicable deadline.
3. Producers complete maps and tract sheets at home then bring them to the FSA Office for data loading. The following information will be needed: (A) Tobacco acreage and sled row pattern, (B) Shares for each crop, (C) Cropland balanced by field, (D) All fields reported, (E) Planting dates. Producers will be notified when to come by and sign the reports. All computer generated reports must be signed before the applicable crop reporting deadline.
4. Producers visit the office without appointment.

This method is not encouraged because lines may get long.

The annual crop certification process is the basis for all program benefits. Federal crop insurance is based on the information found on the FSA-578, Report of Acreage. It is important that all information be reported timely due to the recent increase in late filed fees.

BOLL WEEVIL ERADICATION PROGRAM

Producers will continue to report their cotton acreage as in the past to the FSA Office. However, NCDA&CS will be sending a billing invoice directly to the producer. Payments will not be accepted at the Wayne County FSA Office. The assessment for the 2007 Boll Weevil Eradication Program has decreased this year to \$3.15 per acre.

Preventing Fraud, Waste

The Farm Service Agency and Risk Management Agency are partners in preventing fraud, waste and abuse in the Federal Crop Insurance Program. FSA has and will continue to assist RMA and insurance providers by monitoring crop conditions throughout the growing season. In addition, FSA will refer all suspected cases of fraud, waste and abuse to RMA.

Producers can report suspected cases to the county office staff, RMA or the Office of the Inspector General.

Nomination Forms

In order to increase awareness of the County committee election process, FSA will be mailing nomination petitions to all producers in Wayne County. This year a producer is eligible to be a County FSA committee member if the producer resides in the LAA-3 which consists of Stoney Creek, Saulston, New Hope and Indian Springs townships.

CROP LOSSES

Notice of loss to all crops including Fruits and Vegetables that have been damaged by weather conditions need to be reported to the local Farm Service Agency within 15 days of damage. All 2006 production on Fruit and Vegetable crops needs to be reported to the Wayne County FSA Office on or before June 30, 2007

Controlled Substances

Program participants convicted under federal or state law of any planting, cultivating, growing, producing, harvesting or storing a controlled substance are ineligible for program payments and benefits.

If convicted of one of these offenses, the program participant shall be ineligible during that crop year and the four succeeding crop years for direct and counter-cyclical payments, price support loans, loan deficiency payments, market loan gains, storage payments, farm facility loans, Non-insured Crop Disaster Assistance Program payments or disaster payments.

Program participants convicted of any federal or state offense consisting of the distribution (trafficking) of a controlled substance shall, at the discretion of the court, be ineligible for any or all program payments and benefits:
