

2002 Emergency Grazing of CRP Acreage

Approved by: Acting Deputy Administrator, Farm Programs



1 Overview

A

Background

Section 1232(a)(7) of the Food Security Act of 1985, as amended, authorizes, in the case of a drought or other emergency, the Secretary to permit "emergency" haying and grazing of CRP acreage.

In some areas, severe weather conditions during 2002 have depleted hay supplies and affected the growth and yield of hay and pasture in calendar year 2002.

It has been determined that conditions are such that emergency grazing of certain CRP acreage is authorized, pending CEPD determination on a county-by-county basis.

COC's may request emergency grazing for all or part of the county.

Emergency haying is not authorized at this time.

B

Purpose

This notice provides 2002 emergency grazing procedure.

1 Overview (Continued)

C

General Information

CEPD may authorize emergency grazing of CRP acreage in all or part of an affected county, based on a COC request, with concurrence by STC.

Notes: When a county receives authorization for grazing in part of a county, the remainder of the county is **not** eligible.

An entire CRP field, which is partially located in an ineligible part of the county, may be grazed as part of the eligible part of the county.

Counties contiguous to an approved county are **not** approved for CRP grazing.

Emergency authorization shall be provided for grazing from the date of CEPD approval for the county through the earlier of:

- August 31, 2002
- when STC or COC determines emergency grazing is no longer warranted in a county.

Conditions shall be reviewed on a monthly basis to determine whether continued grazing is warranted. STC and COC shall review conditions in each county and shall discontinue authorization when conditions no longer warrant emergency grazing of CRP acreage.

Only livestock operations located within approved counties are eligible for emergency grazing of CRP acreage.

Grazing privileges may be used at an eligible producer's discretion within the limitations of this notice. CRP participants with acreage in approved counties may lease grazing privileges to any eligible livestock producer located in an approved county.

D

Eligible Acreage

Acreage eligible for emergency grazing includes acreage devoted to practice CP1, CP2, CP4B, CP4D, CP10, CP18B, or CP18C.

E

Ineligible Acreage

Acreage ineligible for emergency grazing includes acreage devoted to:

- useful life easements
- land within 100 feet of a stream or other permanent waterbody
- the following practices:

CP3, CP3A, CP4, CP4A, CP5, CP5A, CP6, CP7, CP8, CP8A, CP9, CP11, CP12, CP13A, CP13B, CP13C, CP13D, CP14, CP15, CP15A, CP16, CP16A, CP17, CP17A, CP18, CP18A, CP19, CP20, CP21, CP22, CP23, CP24, CP25, CP26, CP27, and CP28.

County Eligibility Criteria

County eligibility is based on COC submitting evidence that the county is suffering from a **40** percent or greater loss of normal hay and pasture production, and either of the following conditions exists:

- for drought conditions, precipitation levels indicate an average of **40** percent or greater loss of normal precipitation for the 4 most recent months, plus the days in the current month before the date of request
- for excessive moisture conditions, precipitation levels indicate an average of 140 percent or greater increase in normal precipitation during the 4 most recent consecutive months, plus the days in the current month before the date of request.

COC must provide justification for and an explanation of the need for emergency measures to address a livestock emergency condition that exists in the county. This justification must be particularly compelling for requests submitted during the designated primary nesting season for wildlife in the State. Counties meeting the production loss and precipitation change requirements will not be automatically approved. Consideration will be given to the nature and extent of the livestock emergency and the timing of the request.

Emergency grazing shall be confined to the acreage physically located within the boundary of the eligible county, regardless of where the headquarters for the farm is located.

Note: An entire CRP field, which is partially located in an ineligible county, may be grazed as part of an eligible county.

1 Overview (Continued)

G

General Producer Eligibility Criteria

When emergency grazing is authorized, all eligible CRP participants in the approved area may graze eligible CRP acreage.

Note: CRP participants with acreage in approved counties may rent or lease grazing privileges to any eligible livestock producer located in an approved county.

2 CRP Grazing Provisions

A

General Provisions

CRP participants:

- may request approval to graze eligible acreage after the county has received authorization from CEPD
- must obtain a modified conservation plan to include grazing requirements, as determined by NRCS

Note: The grazing plan must be site specific and reflect the local wildlife needs and concerns.

- must leave at least 25 percent of each field or contiguous fields ungrazed for wildlife, or graze no more than 75 percent of the stocking rate determined by NRCS

Note: The option selected by the CRP participants has no effect on the grazing payment reduction. See paragraph 3.

- who do **not** own or lease livestock, may rent or lease the grazing privilege to an eligible livestock producer located in an approved county. CRP participants who rent or lease the grazing privilege to an eligible livestock producer shall:
 - inform the County Office of the producer's name
 - identify the acreage to be grazed on an aerial photocopy.

2 CRP Grazing Provisions (Continued)

A

General Provisions (Continued)

Eligible livestock producers who are renting or leasing eligible acreage from a CRP participant, before any grazing occurs, shall:

- sign a statement that he or she will not sublease CRP acreage
- receive notification of approval, in writing, from COC. A copy of the notification shall be given to the CRP participant.

Participants who graze CRP acreage without approval, or fail to follow this notice, will be subject to the noncompliance provisions in 2-CRP, paragraph 340.

Fencing, watering, or other equipment may be established at the producer's expense, if necessary, to ensure that the required area remains ungrazed. Using other Federal C/S assistance on CRP land requires repayment of CRP C/S according to 2-CRP, paragraph 375.

The animal unit stocking rate, determined by NRCS and approved on the Forage Inventory and Annual Grazing Plan, shall not be exceeded. As an alternative, the use of a minimum acceptable stubble height may be authorized consistent with recommendations of the NRCS State Agronomist or NRCS grazing specialist.

In developing grazing requirements, NRCS shall give special consideration to the potential impact of grazing on nesting wildlife and develop plans in a manner that minimizes disruption of wildlife nesting.

B

Participant Provisions

CRP participants shall file a request to graze CRP acreage before grazing begins. CRP participants shall take the following actions.

Step	Action
1	Identify the acreage to be grazed on an aerial photocopy.
2	Obtain a modified conservation plan to include grazing requirements, as determined by NRCS. The grazing plan must be site specific and reflect the local wildlife needs and concerns. Note: The animal unit stocking rate, determined by NRCS and approved on the Forage Inventory and Annual Grazing Plan, shall not be exceeded. As an alternative, the use of a minimum acceptable stubble height may be authorized consistent with recommendations of the NRCS State Agronomist or NRCS grazing specialist.

3	Record intended use on DF-21. See Exhibit 1.
4	<p>Sign the agreement in Exhibit 2.</p> <p>Note: All participants are required to sign the agreement before grazing begins, unless the required payment reduction is paid in advance. When the payment reduction is paid in advance, only 1 signature is required.</p>
5	<p>Leave at least 25 percent of each field or contiguous fields ungrazed for wildlife, or graze no more than 75 percent of the stocking rate determined by NRCS.</p> <p>Note: The option selected by CRP participants has no effect on the grazing payment rate reduction. See paragraph 3.</p>
6	<p>Receive notification of approval, in writing, from COC.</p> <p>Livestock producers who rent or lease acreage from CRP participants shall:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • sign a statement agreeing not to sublease the CRP acreage • receive notification of approval from COC. <p>Note: A copy of the notification shall be given to the CRP participant.</p>
7	Re-establish CRP cover, at their own expense, if the cover fails as a result of emergency grazing.

3 Payment Reductions

A

Grazing Payment Reduction Rates

The FY 2003 CRP-1 annual rental payment scheduled to be made after October 1, 2002, shall be reduced by the **number of acres actually grazed in FY 2002**, regardless of the stocking rate, times the CRP per acre annual rental payment times **25** percent.

Notes: The **25** percentage reduction shall be used for **all** approved FY 2002 grazing requests.

The required reduction may be prepaid by participants approved for grazing and recorded according to 3-FI.

Payments shall be reduced for all acreage grazed, regardless of stocking rate.

4 Compliance

A

Required Spot Checks

To ensure that CRP cover is not damaged, wildlife and associated habitat is protected, and participants are complying with the grazing plans, COC's shall spot-check at least 25 percent of the contracts approved for emergency grazing. Spot checks shall be completed before September 3, 2002, according to this notice.

B

Maintenance Defaults

When unauthorized grazing is discovered, follow 2-CRP, paragraph 340, and use the provisions in this table to determine the grazing payment reduction.

IF the maintenance default is on...	THEN...
less than the reported acreage	compute emergency grazing payment reduction on the determined acreage.
greater than the reported acreage and COC determines the participant made a good faith effort to comply	compute emergency grazing payment reduction on the reported acreage and assess a payment reduction on the acres in excess of the reported acreage according to 2-CRP, paragraph 340.
greater than the reported acreage and COC determines the participant did not make a good faith effort to comply	terminate CRP-1 according to 2-CRP, paragraph 288.

5 Producer Reporting Requirements

A

Reporting Grazing Activity

Participants must report the number of acres grazed by September 6, 2002. County Offices may assume that grazing is continuing until notified by the participant that it has ended.

Note: All livestock shall be removed before the earlier of:

- September 1, 2002
 - 10 calendar days from the date that emergency grazing is no longer warranted, as determined by STC or COC.

6 County Office Action

A

Requesting Authority

COC shall submit requests for authorization for emergency grazing of CRP acreage to CEPD, through the State Office. Requests shall include at a minimum:

- CCC-654 that was completed according to Exhibit 3
- detailed narrative description of disaster conditions in the county

Note: As in past years, the narrative is intended to further describe the conditions in the area in support of the documentation provided in the request.

- copy of COC minutes and recommendation
- explanation of livestock emergency and justification of need for emergency measures.

When COC is requesting authorization for emergency grazing in only a part of the county, the County Office shall submit:

- CCC-654, completed according to Exhibit 3, for the:
 - entire county
 - affected area

A

Requesting Authority (Continued)

- county map clearly showing the part of the county affected by the disaster

Note: The affected area should be outlined by township boundaries, roads, highways, streams, or other identifiable landmarks.

- detailed narrative description of disaster conditions in the county.

Note: If the request for part of a county is approved, the part of the county not covered by the request shall **not** be eligible for grazing of CRP.

COC shall ensure that an eligible livestock producer, to whom the acreage is rented or leased, is located in an approved county or part of a county, as applicable.

All requests and CEPD determinations shall be recorded in the COC minutes.

COC shall clearly document in the COC minutes:

- justification for the request to release CRP for emergency grazing
- monthly review of conditions in the county and the basis used to determine whether continued grazing is warranted.

STC, or designee, shall thoroughly review COC requests for completeness and make a recommendation before submitting requests to CEPD. STC shall consider whether emergency measures are truly justified, particularly for requests submitted before the conclusion of the primary nesting season. Failure to submit complete requests with STC, or designee, recommendation will delay CEPD response.

B

After CEPD Approval

After CEPD approves COC's request, COC shall notify all participants in the county or part of the county, as applicable, of the authorization to graze CRP acreage by the fastest means possible.

After CEPD County Offices shall take the following actions.

Step	Action
1	Notify all CRP participants of the provisions in this notice.
2	Require interested participants to sign DF-21 or a similar computer-generated form. Note: Only one CRP participant must sign and date DF-21. Another participant's agreement will be recognized by signing the agreement in Exhibit 2.
3	Instruct the participant to identify the acreage to be grazed on an aerial photocopy.
4	Require all participants on CRP-1 to sign Exhibit 2, agreeing to the terms and conditions and the payment reduction before grazing begins, unless the required reduction is paid in advance. Note: County Offices shall keep the original Exhibit 2 and give a copy to the participant.
5	Require CRP participants, who grazed CRP acres or rented or leased grazing privileges, to report the number of acres actually grazed, and sign and date DF-25 (Exhibit 4) by the earlier of: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • September 6, 2002 • 10 calendar days from the date notified by the County Office that emergency grazing authorization has ended.
6	Complete required spot check according to subparagraph 4 A.

C

**County Office
Report**

The County Office shall report to the State Office by September 20, 2002, the number of CRP:

- contracts in the county
 - contracts where grazing under this authority actually occurred
 - acres actually grazed under this emergency grazing authority.

7 STC Action

A Requests From COC

STC's, or designee, shall:

- review all COC requests for completeness, **factual** information, and to verify production loss
- **Note:** COC requests that are incomplete, inaccurate, or do not meet the criteria according to subparagraph 1 F shall be disapproved by STC and **not** submitted to CEPD.
- before FAXing to CEPD, ensure that requests include all required documentation, including STC, or designee, recommendation, according to subparagraph 6 A
- FAX acceptable requests and supporting documentation directly to CEPD at 202-720-4619, after SED, or designee, signs and dates CCC-654, item 49, and checks the appropriate box for STC concurrence
- ensure that all CRP participants have been informed of the provisions in this notice
- ensure that County Offices spot-check the appropriate number of CRP-1's according to subparagraph 4 A
- review the conditions in each county on a monthly basis to determine whether continued grazing is warranted

Notes: When weather, pasture, and feed crop conditions improve sufficiently, authority to graze CRP shall be terminated in applicable counties and emergency grazing of CRP acreage shall cease.

STC shall clearly document the review of the conditions in each county and the basis to continue or discontinue grazing in the STC minutes.

- when a determination is made to cease emergency grazing authorization, notify County Offices that participants have 10 calendar days from the date of being notified by the County Office that emergency grazing authorization has ended to remove livestock from CRP acreage
- notify County Offices of CEPD determination according to subparagraph C.

STC Report

STC, or designee, shall report to CEPD, through EDSO, by October 11, 2002, the number of:

- CRP-1's in the State
- CRP-1's grazed under this emergency grazing authority
- CRP acres grazed under this emergency grazing authority
- counties where authority to graze ceased before August 31, 2002, because of an improvement in conditions.

Note: Negative reports are required.

Notification

of CEPD

Determination

CEPD shall:

- review requests for completeness, for **factual** information, and to verify production loss

Notes: All requests submitted that are complete, factual, and contain STC, or designee, recommendation should be answered within 1 workday.

Incomplete and/or inaccurate requests will be returned to the State Office for correction.

- prepare approval or denial for the request based on the provisions in this notice. Notification shall be made by CEPD to the State Office by FAX.

The State Office shall notify County Offices immediately:

- by telephone or e-mail after receiving CEPD determination
 - in writing as soon as possible after receiving determination.

**Conservation Reserve Program
Terms and Conditions for Emergency Grazing of CRP Acreage for 2002**

I/We hereby request authority for emergency grazing of approved cover on CRP acreage.

I/We agree to: (1) obtain a modified conservation plan to include grazing, as determined by the Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS); (2) re-establish, at my/our own expense, any cover destroyed or damaged as a result of participating under this authority, regardless of recommendation or determinations made by NRCS; and (3) remove all livestock from CRP acreage before the earlier of September 1, 2002, or 10 calendar days from the date notified by the County Farm Service Agency (FSA) office that emergency grazing authorization has ended.

Check the payment reduction option applicable to this contract:

_____ The payment reduction has been paid in advance.

_____ The FY 2003 annual rental payment, scheduled to be made after October 1, 2002, will be reduced by the number of acres actually grazed, regardless of the stocking rate, times **25 percent** of the CRP annual per acre payment rate.

I/We agree to leave at least 25 percent of each field or contiguous fields ungrazed for wildlife, or graze no more than 75 percent of the stocking rate determined by NRCS.

If acreage grazed is more or less than originally intended, I/we will notify the County FSA Office so the CRP annual rental payment can be adjusted accordingly.

CRP-1 is subject to termination or other penalties as may be authorized by the CRP contract and regulations should there be any violation of this grazing authority of CRP acreage.

If the payment reduction has not been paid in advance, all signatories on CRP-1 shall sign these conditions before grazing begins.
