

FEMA Designates 6 West Virginia Counties as a Natural Disaster Area Due to Severe Storm, Straight-line Winds, Flooding, Landslides and Mudslides that occurred February 15 to February 18, 2025 - Lawrence County in Ohio is Eligible as Contiguous County

Emergency Designation | Ohio | April 01, 2025

This Presidential disaster declaration allows the United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) Farm Service Agency (FSA) to extend much-needed emergency credit to producers recovering from natural disasters through emergency loans.

Emergency loans can be used to meet various recovery needs including the replacement of essential items such as equipment or livestock, reorganization of a farming operation, or to refinance certain debts. FSA will review the loans based on the extent of losses, security available, and repayment ability. USDA's FSA offers these loans for losses caused by severe storms, straight-line winds, flooding, landslides, and mudslides that occurred on February 15 to February 18, 2025. The deadline for producers in designated primary and contiguous counties to apply for loans is November 19, 2025.

Impacted Area: West Virginia, Kentucky, Ohio, and Virginia

Triggering Disaster: Severe storm, straight-line winds, flooding, landslides, mudslides that occurred on February 15 to February 18, 2025.

Application Deadline: November 19, 2025.

Primary Counties Eligible:

West Virginia - Greenbrier, Lincoln, Logan, Monroe, Summers and Wayne Counties.

Contiguous Counties Also Eligible:

Kentucky - Boyd, Lawrence, and Martin Counties.

Ohio -Lawrence County.

Virginia - Allegheny, Bath, Craig, and Giles Counties.

West Virginia - Boone, Cabell, Fayette, Kanawha, Mercer, Mingo, Nicholas, Pocahontas, Putnam, Raleigh, Webster and Wyoming Counties.
