

USDA Designates Five Idaho Counties as Primary Natural Disaster Areas

Emergency Designation | Idaho | September 18, 2025

Fourteen contiguous counties in Idaho are eligible for assistance

This Secretarial natural disaster designation allows the United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) Farm Service Agency (FSA) to extend much-needed emergency credit to producers recovering from natural disasters through emergency loans. Emergency loans can be used to meet various recovery needs including the replacement of essential items such as equipment or livestock, reorganization of a farming operation, or to refinance certain debts. FSA will review the loans based on the extent of losses, security available, and repayment ability.

According to the U.S. Drought Monitor, these counties suffered from a drought intensity value during the growing season of 1) D2 Drought-Severe for 8 or more consecutive weeks or 2) D3 Drought-Extreme or D4 Drought-Exceptional.

Application Deadline: May 8, 2026

Primary Counties Eligible:

• Idaho: Boundary, Butte, Custer, Jefferson, and Valley

Contiguous Counties Also Eligible:

• Idaho: Adams, Bingham, Blaine, Boise, Bonner, Bonneville, Clark, Elmore, Fremont, Gem, Idaho, Lemhi and Madison

• Montana: Lincoln

Washington: Pend Oreille

Triggering Disaster #2 - S6063

Impacted Area: Washington and Idaho

Triggering Disaster: Drought (Fast Track)

Application Deadline: May 8, 2026

Primary Counties Eligible:

• Washington: Adams, Ferry, Grant, Island, Lincoln, Pend Oreille and Stevens

Contiguous Counties Also Eligible:

- Idaho: Bonner and Boundary
- Washington: Benton, Douglas, Franklin, Jefferson, Kitsap, Kittitas, Okanogan, Skagit, Snohomish, Spokane, Whitman, and Yakima
