



USDA Designates Two Florida Counties as Primary Natural Disaster Areas

Emergency Support to Producers in Surrounding Counties Also Available

WASHINGTON, Dec. 11, 2019 - Agriculture Secretary Sonny Perdue designated two Florida counties as primary natural disaster areas. Producers in Jackson and Washington counties who suffered losses due to recent drought may be eligible for U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) Farm Service Agency (FSA) [emergency loans](#).

This natural disaster designation allows FSA to extend much-needed emergency credit to producers recovering from natural disasters. Emergency loans can be used to meet various recovery needs including the replacement of essential items such as equipment or livestock, reorganization of a farming operation or the refinance of certain debts.

Producers in the contiguous Florida counties of Bay, Calhoun, Gadsden, Holmes, Liberty, and Walton, along with Geneva and Houston counties in Alabama, and Seminole County, Georgia, are also eligible to apply for emergency loans.

The deadline to apply for these emergency loans is June 19, 2020.

FSA will review the loans based on the extent of losses, security available and repayment ability.

The Secretary previously declared several other Florida counties as primary natural disaster areas. A listing of all disaster designations can be found at fsa.usda.gov.
