



USDA Designates Nine Mississippi Counties as Primary Natural Disaster Areas

Emergency Designation | October 07, 2022

This Secretarial natural disaster designation allows the United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) Farm Service Agency (FSA) to extend much-needed emergency credit to producers recovering from natural disasters through [emergency loans](#). Emergency loans can be used to meet various recovery needs including the replacement of essential items such as equipment or livestock, reorganization of a farming operation or the refinance of certain debts. FSA will review the loans based on the extent of losses, security available and repayment ability.

According to the [U.S. Drought Monitor](#), these counties suffered from a drought intensity value during the growing season of 1) D2 Drought-Severe for 8 or more consecutive weeks or 2) D3 Drought-Extreme or D4 Drought-Exceptional.

Impacted Area: Mississippi

Triggering Disaster: Drought

Application Deadline: April 26, 2023

Primary Counties Eligible:Alcorn, Chickasaw, Lafayette, Lee, Marshall, Monroe, Pontotoc, Tishomingo and Union

Contiguous Counties Also Eligible:

Mississippi: Benton, Calhoun, Clay, DeSoto, Itawamba, Lowndes, Panola, Prentiss, Tate, Tippah, Webster and Yalobusha

Alabama: Colbert, Franklin, Lamar, Lauderdale and Marion

Tennessee: Fayette, Hardeman, Hardin, McNairy and Shelby
